NAVY TAKES LEAD IN FENCING MEET

Midshipmen Win 50 Bouts and Head Columbia by 3 Points at Annapolis

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ANNAPOLIS, Md., March 23 -Navy's team was in command at the conclusion of the first day of the National Collegiate fencing championships.

The Annapolis trio accumulated 50 points. Thirty-nine colleges were represented in the tournament. The large entry, which included thirty-six contestants in the foil, thirty-five in the epee and thirty-six in the saber, brought some problems for the committee in charge.

Some last-minute changes in the schedule were made because round robins in each weapon and a total of 1,855 bouts must be completed by tomorrow evening.

Although a night session was not in the original plans, fencing continued this evening. . The competition had started at 8:30 A.M.

Early Start Planned

Tomorrow the fencers will assemble in the gymnasium at MacDonough Hall at 7:30 A. M. The lunch period of an hour and a half has been canceled and sandwiches and bouillion will be served in the hall while bouts are in progress in an effort to finish by 5 P. M. The midshipmen accumulated 17 points in the foil, 16 in epée and 17 in saber to lead Columbia. The Lions, last year's champions, were in second place with 47. Princeton had 46 and Yale 44. Illinois, the Big Ten champion, had 42. Navy was aided by some top performances. Their saber man, Jim Wolverton, had a 17-1 record to temporarily share the lead in the race for the individual title in this group. Len Parmacek of Wisconsin was his chief rival. Len, a brother of the former champion, Bob Parmacek of Penn, was unbeaten through He finished thirteen bouts. eighteen bouts with a 17-1 mark. Both Parmacek and Wolverton lost to the same man, Arthur Schankin of Illinois.
