Hicks of Princeton Victor in 32 of 33 Bouts in Foils— **Epee Title to Pesthy**

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 21—Princeton won the team fencing championship of the National Collegiate Athletic Association for the first time today and captain Bill Hicks, a senior from Englewood, N. J., became the first Tiger to carry off the individual foil title.

Although he failed to qualify for the Eastern finals a week ago, Hicks finished with the best record of any of the 105 swordsmen from 38 colleges competing in the 20th annual championships at Harvard University.

Hicks won 32 bouts and lost one-to Marvin Garovoy of New York University, the Eastern champion who was runner-up here with 29 bouts won and four lost.

The fencer whose style and proficiency provoked the most comment was Paul Pesthy, 26year-old Rutgers sophomore, the winner of the épèe championship with a 31-3 record.

The son of the Rutgers coach, Pesthy was United States pentathlon champion in 1962 and last year was runner-up in the national championships. He won the Eastern crown last week.

Craig Bell of Illinois is the new saber champion. He won 31 bouts and lost four.

Princeton's margin over runner-up New York University was two victories—81 to 79. Columbia, the defending titleholder and Ivy champion, which lost its Eastern title to Navy last week, was third with 76 victories.

Navy was fourth with 75. Then came Notre Dame, 73; Air Force Academy, 71; Illinois, 70; Pennsylvania, 68, and Harvard, 67.

In addition to Hicks, John O'Sullivan and Bob White were the members of the Princeton team. O'Sullivan won 26 victories with saber and White 25 with épée.

The Tiger placed second in 1961, its best previous showing, third in 1960 and fourth in 1956. It was sixth in the Eastern championships last week. Stanley Sieja, the coach, is serving

his 18th year. The first three men to place with each weapon are in line to be named as all-Americans and members of the United States Olympic squad. In foil, Ron Schwartz of Cornell took third place behind Hicks and Garovoy. Then came Bill Ferrens of Notre Dame, Dan Kirsch of Harvard and Steve Weinstein of Columbia.
