

# TWO N.Y.U. FENCERS WIN N.C.A.A. TITLES

DURHAM, N. C., March 25 (AP)—New York University won two of the three individual titles today in the National Collegiate fencing championships and became a strong favorite for the team title, which will be decided tomorrow.

The N.Y.U. winners were Paul Apostol in saber, with a 10-1 won-lost record in the finals, and Al Davis in foil with 8-1.

Bernhardt Herman of the University of Iowa won in the épée division with a 9-2 mark. The defending champion, Paul Pesthy of Rutgers, was second at 8-3. Herman beat Pesthy, 5-4, in their match.

Eight fencers from 35 schools are competing at the Duke University indoor stadium. Columbia won the team championship last year with 76 points. N.Y.U. was second with 74 and Princeton third with 70. Columbia, Princeton and other Ivy League schools are not competing this time because of a dispute with the N.C.A.A.

Apostol, 20 years old, from East Northport, L.I., is a junior. In the preliminaries, semi-finals and finals he had a combined record of 24-3.
