Columbia Fencers Win N.C.A.A. Title

DETROIT, March 30—Columbia University, led by Frank Lowy, won its seventh National Collegiate fencing championship today. The Lions scored 92 points in the three-day meet at Wayne State University, 5 more than the defending champion, New York University, which placed second.

Penn, by winning 27 of 43 bouts today, had a total of 84 points to take over third place from City College of New York. The Beavers had 81.

Lowy, who started the tournament by winning all 10 of his saber bouts Thursday, ended it almost as well. He won seven straight matches in the morning session, and ended the day

with a 9-1 won-lost record. His

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total of 29-4 for the tournament, gave him second place with the weapon. First place in the saber went

to Todd Makler of Pennsylvania. The 6-foot-2-inch fencer!

compiled a 31-2 record to retain his N.C.A.A. crown. Both of his losses came yesterday and one was to Lowy. Makler was the only one of three

defending champions to win again. Despite their 1-2 placing, neither Makler nor Lowy was named the outstanding saberman. That honor, and the Mich-

igan State Memorial Award, went to John Swanson of the Air Force Academy. Swanson, who was fourth last year, dropped to a tie for fifth place with Mike Daher of

Notre Dame. Each won 25 and lost 14. Actually these two, and Michael Marion of Cornell, and Bill Hube of North Carolina identical had

slates. However, Swanson and Daher remained tied, since both had identical touches-for and touches-against records. Marion was seventh and Hube eighth. Fourth place went to Bill Scott of N.Y.U. The other two Lion fencers performed almost as well as Lowy. Jeffrey Kestler, who was undefeated in 16 fail bouts

with a 34-5 record. Gaylor and Borkowsky each had 32-7 records, but the Violet fencer, last year's champion in foil, took

third place on the basis of touches. Borkowsky had 97 touches against him, seven more than Gaylor.
