Columbia Fencers Trail Detroit in N.C.A.A. Meet

CHICAGO, March 24 - The University of Detroit moved into an excellent position today to become the first non-Eastern school in 13 years to capture a National Collegiate fencing championship.

Not since the University of Illinois accomplished the feat in 1958 has the N.C.A.A. fencing title left the East Coast. Northwestern in 1941, Ohio State in 1942 and Illinois again in 1956 are the only non-Eastern schools ever to win crowns.

After the second round of fencing at the 28th annual meet, Detroit held a 49-48 advantage over Columbia in the team standing. New York University, which tied with Colum bia for last year's title, is third with 45 points.

The final round of the threeday event will be held tomorrow at the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle.

Detroit was led by the defending foil champion, Tyrone Simmons, who had a 12-0 wonlost record; Fred Hooker, who was 11-1 in epee, and Ken Blake, who had an 11-1 mark in saber.

Detroit Coach Pleased

"We are right in the position that we want to be," said Perry, Detroit Richard the coach. At last year's championships, Detroit finished second with 63 points, 5 behind Colum-

"Tomorrow's round will be the key," said N.Y.U. Coach Hugo Castello. "The top men in each weapon will be pitted against each other and that should tell the story."

In tomorrow's opening match, Soriano will face Blake in a saber bout.
