



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

I report at the start of a momentous year – 2012, with a home Olympic Games in London. For those committed to any sport, and especially all of us in the fencing corner, it don't get much better! Let's hope we celebrate this fantastic year with all the enjoyment there should be – and achieve a great legacy for our sport.



Let me start with an update on our 3G (Green, Grow, Gold) strategy. There is very good news on Green: we have attained the Green status for British Fencing on the latest assessment by the independent judges employed by our funders, Sport England and UK Sport. It's been a hard journey from the Red verdict just 18 months ago, for which much credit is due to our CEO, Piers Martin, who led the effort to bring our governance and systems up to the required standards.

What does this mean? We aim to be a world-class governing body, giving high standards of service to fencers and members, and effective leadership to the sport. The Green rating shows we are making the right progress. But we know there is more to do – and we are setting new goals and targets. We learned from members' comments and questions at the recent AGM; we are learning from the continuing Road Shows and of course from our postbag. I say to all members: do keep telling us where we can and should do more and better, for you and for the sport.

The other parts of the 3G mission are Grow and Gold. On Grow, as I reported at the AGM, we are NOT one of the seven sports out of 46 funded by Sport England who are hitting the agreed targets for increased participation. As measured by the Active People survey, we are behind where we aimed to be. It is

essential that we get growth going – your Board is determined to develop the grass roots. So, we have brought together a new Grow Committee to advise us, and will be adjusting our plans and programmes to enhance the demand for fencing.

The Gold agenda is also behind schedule. Our results at the recent European and World Championships were disappointing. But, under Performance Manager Alex Newton, our elite squad is working harder than ever, with some excellent coaches, and the fencers tell me that the quality and level of support for them is better than ever before.

Olympic selection will be based on that already announced. The Board sees no case for change; we want to stick anyway to what the athletes have worked to so far. There is, of course, a major opportunity for all of them, with the eight discretionary Olympic places – all of which will be filled. There will be more British fencers than ever before competing in this Olympic Games – more for us to cheer on.

As part of the Green agenda, we are still looking hard at how BF operates. I am personally conducting a review of the Board itself. Any changes in our Articles to be recommended will come to members for decision. Just about to start is a Capability Review of Head Office conducted by Peter King, well known as the CEO who led the transformation of British Cycling from near bankruptcy in 1997 to its winning status today. I'm sure he will give us good advice. We have a working group with the Home Countries developing a new and improved membership scheme, for launch in 2012. There are also BF working groups examining the potential for mergers with England Fencing and Wheelchair Fencing.

So, it's a busy British Fencing agenda. So it should be. Your Board, like the members, is ambitious for this great sport. We strive for success at all levels and to be effective and viable – as a governing body, as a voluntary organisation, as a (not for profit) business. Be assured, we are working hard and we aim to make 2012 a very big year for fencing in this country.

AGM

Perhaps it was the promise of a free lunch, but British Fencing's 2011 AGM at the BOA's offices in central London was the most heavily attended for many years. More than 80 people heard BFA President Keith Smith start proceedings by stating that this was his third and last term of office; from 2012 onwards, he suggested that the President might be appointed by the Board.

He announced the following BFA honours: **silver medal** – Philip Marsh; **bronze medal** – John Anderson, Chris Howser, Brian Matless, Lyndon Taylor; **Award of Merit** – Beth Davidson, Graham Langton, Ken McCubbin, Tim O'Connor, Shirley Parker; **Goblets & Tankards** – Kristjan Archer, Sue Benney, Richard Kruse, Men's junior

foil team (James Davis, Jamie Fitzgerald, Husayan Rosowsky, Alex Tofalides), Men's senior foil team (Laurence Halsted, Ed Jefferies, Richard Kruse, Marcus Mepstead), Ziemek Wojciechowski, Maciej Wojtkowiak.

In his report, Chairman David Teasdale spoke of the 3G strategy and pointed out that 54% of British Fencing's income came from the public purse. One of its funding bodies, Sport England, surveyed the participation results for the 46 sports they support and after 2 years only seven were achieving their targets; fencing was not among them.

He announced two proposals for mergers under consideration – one with England Fencing and the other with Wheelchair Fencing – which working parties were looking into with the intention of bringing

recommendations to the membership. All committees were being reviewed and a new one had been formed: the Finance and Audit Committee chaired by Andrew Brannon.

He hoped that BF would come out of 2012 with a legacy of a national training facility, a better membership scheme, a good club in every Olympic borough and more Swordmark clubs. He asked for any other legacy suggestions from the membership.

A lengthy question-and-answer session gave members the opportunity to air their concerns and for representatives of BF to clarify issues. Asked to comment on selection procedure, Performance Manager Alex Newton said she followed objective criteria, looking at trajectories of recent performance with the aim of selecting those who could challenge the best in the world. However, the fact was that only three British fencers were in the world top 50 across all weapons. UK Sport's funding programme was performance driven and British Fencing had not met a single milestone target since the programme had started.

David Teasdale said fencers as well as administrators would be involved in awarding the eight discretionary host-nation places at the Olympic Games. Alex Newton confirmed that all eight places would be allocated, but emphasised that fencers had to have realistic medal prospects in 2012 or 2016. She added that fencers could fund themselves to World Cup events.

Asked about how the Grow programme could be encouraged, England Fencing President Ray Stafford said a kit hire-to-buy scheme was available from EF to help start new clubs. Georgina Usher described the sort of situation where such a scheme could be useful – starter sessions for adults run by fencing parents of young children at venues

where other parents waited while their children took part in various activities.

Fencing father Ed Peck outlined the work of the Parents' Group, which was set up in 2010 to help children develop as fencers and to improve communication between parents and BF. Most recently, they had introduced the Best Run Fencing Competition awards as a constructive way of recognising good competitions and of suggesting improvements, using surveys that parents can complete at each event. Their main concern was the cost and organisation of international trips for cadet and junior fencers. The group had agreed with BF that fencers should be allowed to travel independently from the main squad in order to take advantage of cheaper travel deals or to use more convenient routes and travel times. SPORT SATISFACTION AND PARTICIPATION

Sport England's third annual survey of sports shows that overall satisfaction in fencing has increased marginally from 78.8 in 2009 to 79.2 in 2011. A total of 716 fencers (aged 14 and over) took part in the survey – 98 general participants, 571 club members and 47 talent pool members. When asked to rate the current British Fencing membership fee in terms of value for money, on average 37% thought it represented good value (with 46% of the talent pool marking it as such), 47% were neutral and 16% thought it offered poor value.

Founded when the Surrey County Fencing Union was going through a difficult time, the club did much to reinvigorate fencing in Surrey by improving organisation of events, encouraging more competition and building up enthusiasm for the sport locally.

Although epee is said to be the most popular weapon, of those responding to the survey 43% identified their main weapon as foil, 35% as epee and 19% as sabre, with 3% non-specific.

But Sport England's fifth annual Active People survey shows that the number of fencers aged 16+ taking part in their sport at least once a week fell slightly from 15,000 in 2007/8 to 13,700 in 2010/11. Of the 30 sports for which a four-year comparison could be made, only four – athletics, boxing, mountaineering and table tennis – showed a significant increase in participation. Nineteen sports saw a significant decrease, while the remaining seven, including fencing, recorded statistically insignificant changes.

101 YEARS AGO

A report in *The Guardian* of 6 February 1911 noted that in France new rules for epee had been introduced. The first hit on the trunk scored three and subsequent hits on the trunk, as well as hits on the arm and hand, scored one point, with hits on the thigh scoring two. These rules were introduced to distinguish between a mere touch on the finger and a more dangerous hit to chest. But the new scoring caused sharp divisions of opinion with purists complaining that fencers would risk hits on the arm or hand for the sake of a higher score on the chest or stomach, so that epee would degenerate into competition fighting rather than duelling as was originally intended.

GOLDEN BULL

British Fencing has won a Golden Bull award from the Plain English Campaign for general jargon and the governance strategy that it "will innovate to ensure that we are successful on the piste." Like fitting Tasers to weapons perhaps – that would certainly wipe the smile off the faces of the opposition at the Olympics. ■

News from the President



We are now on the final leg to the 2012 London Olympic Games. The Test Event was successfully held at Excel in November. My congratulations to Hilary Philbin, Competition Manager, and to Caryl Oliver and Liz Charlton on producing a splendid occasion. It was great to see so many enthusiastic volunteers covering a really broad age range, and to see our Great Britain team win the team event. It will be amazing to have an audience of 8000 watching the fencing next summer; the atmosphere should be electric.

The hosting of the Olympic Games in London is likely to be a once in a lifetime experience for us all. It will allow our selected fencers to perform in front of a home crowd and we hope this will raise their performance and see them win a medal for Great Britain. It will also allow our host allocation of eight referees to have an Olympic experience, our coaches to pit their skills against the very best in the world, and our volunteers to play an integral and vital role in the delivery of a successful Games. The FIE qualification period finishes at the end of March and the European Zonal qualifiers take place in Bratislava in April. Finally, our Host Nation places will be selected by Alex Newton and a selection panel. It will be our largest team since the Barcelona Olympics in 1992.

The Olympics will mark the end of the London Olympiad and the start of the Rio Olympiad. As London ends, British Fencing will begin its programme for developing and managing our sport through to 2016. It needs to look at growing support at home, improving international results and providing an ever improving service to all our members. Both internal and external communications will be a priority. It is certain that British Fencing will be managed in a very different way. This process has already started with the employment of Piers Martin as CEO and David Teasdale as independent Chair. It is likely that the role of President will become non-elected, honorific and symbolic. Our sport will increasingly be run by paid professionals and a key issue will be post-London funding.

I would like to thank all the members who attended the AGM. It was good to honour those who have and continue to contribute so much to our sport. David Teasdale is dealing with members' feedback from the meeting. The GB

championships, Eden Cup, Leon Paul International and all our domestic competitions, not to mention most of our clubs, would not run without volunteers.

Looking to 2012, I would like to wish the Pro Sabre International and the Camden Cadet International every success. Both competitions show that sponsorship can be found to run events. I hope as many of you as possible will come to watch the Women's Sabre FIE World Cup in London in February. And I look forward to seeing great success from our Cadet and Junior fencers at their European and World Championships in March and April.

I wish you all a very happy and successful 2012. ■

Pitting his wits

Richard Cohen talks to William Pitt, the man behind the new sponsorship with British Fencing

The main office of Beazley Group is an imposing modern building five minutes' walk from the Tower of London. To the left of the reception area on the ninth floor stands a glass cabinet advertising their latest partner: British Fencing. A looped video shows fencers (mainly non-British) in action as well as a short instruction section. A placard states that 10,000 people fence in Britain, that there are 400 clubs and more than 90 competitions a year. The cabinet literally holds pride of place.

In January 2011 the firm entered into a sponsorship with British Fencing worth a million pounds over five years, and also became the BFA's official insurer. It is a massive injection of capital, increasing fencing's funding by 32%. The person who engineered the sponsorship is the company's chief marketing officer, who bears the famous name of William Pitt.

Is there any connection to William Pitt the Elder (1708-78), who led Britain during the Seven Years War and was a powerful, but ultimately unsuccessful, advocate in Parliament for the rights of the American colonists? Or his son, Pitt the Younger (1759-1806), who became prime minister at the age of 24? "Sadly not," admits Beazley's Mr Pitt. "My father, though, was a great admirer of both Pitts. But it is a memorable name, and having it does no harm at all."

Pitt is a spry, lean man who fenced briefly at Downside, learning foil under the school's head of Russian. "But I only dabbled." Today he is a keen marathon-runner. He first ran in Venice in 2010, then managed 3 hours 39 minutes in his next race, in Paris; but failed to obtain a space through the ballot for the 2012 London marathon. He has just celebrated his 50th birthday and until he is 59 and enters a new age category has to reach the 'crazy' standard of 3 hours 15 minutes to qualify automatically.

After reading history at Oxford, he moved to Italy for a year, teaching English as a foreign language. Returning to the UK, he went into the insurance business, joining a Lloyd's broker, where he helped Lloyd's members – or Names – put up their works of art as part of their financial guarantee, using these so-called 'unproductive assets' as security. "It was innovative at the time, and interesting to work on."

He left the insurance business for journalism – including a year in Paris as correspondent for *Director* magazine – but returned in the early 1990s when storm clouds were gathering over the Lloyd's market. As the market

endeavoured to put its house in order after massive losses, Pitt was responsible for communication with the Names, some of whom were having to sell their works of art. "It was a very tough time for a lot of people."

After the Lloyd's reconstruction plan was accomplished, Pitt moved to New York. There he joined Marsh, a leading insurance broker, and, later, Beazley, just as the company was establishing a local US presence.

Beazley is a mid-sized specialist insurer, he says, "but we do quite a lot of interesting things under that title." The firm has grown significantly in the last ten years to \$1.7 billion in gross premiums for 2010 and is now the third largest insurer at Lloyd's, with a strong focus on the American market: it insures a third of the top 200 US law firms, more than half the top 50 US engineering and architectural design firms, and half the retail jewellers in the UK. "There are lots of eggs in the Lloyd's basket. We have very focused target markets and pretty high penetration in those markets. We try to stick to our knitting." If not to their metaphors.

In 2009, the firm started to think seriously about sponsorship. One factor was London's imminent role in hosting the 2012 Games. "Were we going to do anything about that? We looked at various sports, having never sponsored in this area before. As we weren't the best people to identify what we wanted, we brought in WSM, a specialist sports marketing agency, and they came up with two candidates: hockey and fencing."

Pitt describes the criteria he and his colleagues applied to their choice. "We were looking for a sport that lacked a principal sponsor – one where we could make a real impact. Something a bit different to the marquee sports which already have tremendous support – say golf or football. At that stage, we hadn't decided on a particular sum of money, although we knew we weren't going to be putting in ten million pounds. We didn't want to commit to a whole lot of cash in a hugely expensive, undifferentiated way, and we didn't want a 'me too' sponsorship."

In 2010, he met Piers Martin and David King, and was impressed. "Fencing is a sport for Everyman – and Everywoman. The people in it tend to be articulate, well-educated and confident -- which from the sponsorship point of view is very nice." Historically it's been something of a toffs' sport, he recognises, "but there's no reason why it should be. I'm enormously impressed by inner city initiatives such as Newham Swords in east London. It's not

just at the international level we would like to have an impact: we want to have an influence at grass roots level as well."

He acknowledges, however, that this is "a big challenge, and one we haven't got our arms round yet. There's definitely been a learning curve for British Fencing and for us, but I feel we have been moving in the right direction."

Day to day responsibility for managing the sponsorship rests with Ian Hoy on Pitt's team. "Ian's been doing a fabulous job. We've held a number of very successful fencing exhibits in the City of London, including one in the Lloyd's building." Hoy also encouraged Hillier, a leading horticultural firm, to create a fencing-themed exhibit for the 2012 Chelsea Flower Show. "We're intrigued to see what they come up with," Pitt says.

Within Beazley, the sponsorship has been very well received. "There's an instinctive feeling that fencing fits in with who we are. There are shared characteristics: in both fencing and insurance, you can lose a lot very quickly if you relax your guard! In both, it's a matter of having the right information and making the right deductions. You need to move quickly and be highly responsive, and so on."

Will Beazley's sponsorship continue beyond 2016? "To be honest with you, I don't know yet." The company will assess matters a year before the sponsorship expires. "The Olympic side is just one dimension, but by no means the whole – it might not reflect well on our risk assessment skills if it were! Of course, one takes a risk on how the national team is going to perform, but we always intended to be in it for the long haul. We see enormous potential for fencing in this country.

"We'd certainly like to leave some kind of legacy and we have five years to do it in," Pitt says. One of the challenges in getting bigger audiences, he accepts, "is the incredible speed of fencing. You need to be a Leonardo da Vinci, who had an eye like a slow-motion camera. But there is more that we can do to deconstruct what's going on and explain the range of skills that underlie each flurry of action. And I've already found that once you get people exposed to fencing, they say, 'Yes, I enjoyed that!'" ■

INDIVIDUAL

MEN'S FOIL

Despite looking fitter and stronger than ever before, Britain's foilists did not have a good day. Richard Kruse was up first against Kawiecki (POL), who had narrowly beaten him in the European championships. This time it was a worse defeat as he quickly lost the first four hits and was 3-6 behind at the break. A combination of languid footwork and the wrong selection of moves saw him crash out 5-15. Laurence Halsted was next against Bachmann (GER) and it was a similar story: 1-5 down at

the first break and 1-10 at the second before making something of a fight back and losing 8-15. Jamie Kenber had an easier first DE, against world No. 137 Kiil (DEN), but only just won 15-14. He then faced the world No. 1, Andrea Cassara (ITA), and was taken apart 15-4. But then Cassara destroyed everyone on his way to the final, beating Sintès (FRA) 15-5 in the first semi-final, while his team-mates Avola and Aspromonte fought it out in the other, Aspromonte edging out the European champion 14-13 on time. He went on to take a 3-1 lead in the final, but Cassara was not to be denied and came through 15-14 to become world champion for the first time.

WOMEN'S FOIL

Sophie Troiano had the dubious honour of facing triple Olympic gold medallist Valentina Vezzali (ITA) – commonly referred to as the poster girl of world fencing. The Italian was 7-1 up at the first break. Troiano did well to take the fight into the third period, but she only scored another two hits before going down 3-15. Martina Emanuel also fell a long way behind in the first period, 2-7, against

Boubakri (TUN) ranked 11th in the world. She made a come back in the second period to trail 9-13 and then scored the first two hits in the third, but the Tunisian scrambled across the line, winning 15-13. Natalia Sheppard faced Chen (CHN) ranked 14th in the world and fenced intelligently to lead 5-4 at the second break. But Chen stepped up a gear in the third period and came through impressively to win 15-8.

The semi-finals saw Vezzali take on the talented 17-year-old American, Lee Kiefer who had knocked out Chen in the L16 and Synoradzka (POL) in the quarter-finals. Vezzali's experience shone through and she won 15-10, having trailed in the early stages. Watch out for this young American though; we'll definitely be seeing more of her in the future. In the other semi the world No. 1, Di Francisca (ITA), beat world No. 3, Nam (KOR), 14-8 on time. So the top two in the world faced off for the gold medal in what turned out to be a completely one-sided affair, Vezzali prevailing 14-7 to take her sixth world title. Asked how she was still able to motivate herself after winning so many titles, she said: "When I'm fencing, in any kind of competition, my aim is to win every time; this is a new motivation that gives me the strength."

MEN'S EPEE

All the top seeds fell in the early stages, proving once again that epee is the most unpredictable of weapons. Take the cases of Jon Willis and Park (KOR). Willis won 4/6 bouts in his poule to be seeded 66th and Park won 3/5 to finish 97th. Both won their first preliminary DEs, but in the second Willis just lost a slow-scoring match against Pop (ROM) 7-8, while Park beat the 33rd seed and then took out the reigning Olympic champion and No. 6 seed Tagliariol (ITA). He continued in brilliant form to reach the semi-finals by beating the No. 3 seed Novosjolov (EST) 15-8 before finally coming unstuck against the European silver medallist Verwijlen (NED).

The second semi saw Kauter (SUI) take an early lead against Pizzo (ITA) before the Italian came through 15-13. The final was full of twists and turns with Verwijlen appearing to have the better tactics. His coach had instructed him to

draw Pizzo's attack and then block and close out. This worked well and he stormed to a 6-2 lead, but then changed tactics and Pizzo came back to equalise. Reverting to his game plan, the Dutchman again took the lead but didn't learn from his earlier mistake and changed tactics again, going on the attack. This played into the hands of Pizzo who picked him off to win the title 15-13.

WOMEN'S EPEE


Although they fought through to the L64, both Sisi Albini and Georgina Usher fell to higher seeded opponents, Albini going down to Dinu (ROM) 9-15 and Usher falling to the world No. 3, Del Carretto (ITA), 8-15. Seeded 32 after winning 5/6 bouts in her poule, Corinna Lawrence faced the 33rd seed, Jevremovic (SRB), and after a tight fight scraped through 15-14. Her next opponent was Zuikova (EST) who had taken out the No. 1 seed, Nisima (FRA), in the previous round. After a cagey start, Lawrence took the lead and stayed in control to win 15-10, becoming the only British fencer at these world championships to reach the L16. Here she drew the tricky world No. 10, Sozanska (GER), and went down 9-15.

The semi-finals were both Sino-Romanian affairs. Sun (CHN) just out-pointed Branza (ROM) 15-14 in the first. The second was a far more compelling fight between Maroiu (ROM) and Li (CHN) during which non-combativity was called in the final minute of real time. Priority went to Li but the Romanian pulled out a three-hit lead with 14 seconds left on the clock. Somehow with just 2 seconds to go, Li tied the scores at 13-all, thus winning on priority. The final was dominated by the 30-year-old Li, who won easily 13-7 at time.

MEN'S SABRE

Once again James Honeybone faced world No. 1, Yakimenko (RUS), as he had done in the European championships. He came out of the blocks fast to go 3-1 up, but this time Yakimenko knew he had a tough fight on his hands and by the break was 8-6 up, going on to win 15-10. It was a surprise to see the Russian lose focus in the L16 and fall to Lapkes (BLR) 14-15. The semi-finals

saw Montano (ITA) beat Gu (KOR) 15-12 and Limbach (GER) take out Tarantino (ITA) by the same score. The final was dominated by the German in the early stages as he took a 4-1 lead. But, in typical Italian style, Montano used every trick in the book to distract his opponent without breaking any rules and by the break had picked up seven consecutive hits to go 8-4 up. A late rally from Limbach closed the gap, but Montano was not to be thwarted and won the title 15-13.

WOMEN'S SABRE

In the L64 Chrystall Nicoll was always behind against Jozwiak (POL), trailing 3-8 at the break and losing 10-15. Undefeated in her poule, Joanna Hutchison was ranked 23rd, but seemed nervous against Navarro (ESP) and went down 9-15. Sophie Williams faced a tough task against the 7th seed, Besbes (TUN), but was only 5-8 down at the break before the Tunisian pulled away to win 15-7. As 32nd seed, Louise Bond-Williams took on the 33rd seed, Laberkai (BRA), and led 8-5 at the break. Then in the second half she started falling short on her attack and the Brazilian pulled back to equalise at 14-all. Most people agree that the referee awarded the last hit incorrectly to the Brazilian, but Bond-Williams was out 14-15.

The semi-finals were contested by the top four in the world, with Zagunis (USA) beating Gavrilova (RUS) 15-8 and Velikaia (RUS) surprising world No. 2 Kharlan 15-7. The final saw Zagunis storm to an 8-3 lead at the break and continue on to go 11-6 up. Then, extraordinarily, Velikaia clawed back the deficit and took the world championship crown 15-14. Afterwards she said: "Mariel Zagunis had a special tactic for this match. When the score was 11-5, I finally found the solution. She did not change her tactic, so I could close the gap. When it was 14-all, it was the one who was stronger at that moment who won."

TEAM

MEN'S FOIL

In the L32, Britain faced Iran and took an early lead before winning comfortably 45-33. The next round was against Germany, ranked one place higher at eighth in the world. After three fights, the British team led 12-9, but the match changed as Kleibrink took ten hits off Jefferies with only two coming back in reply to give the Germans a 19-14 lead. Britain then wilted under the onslaught as Germany won the next three fights 4-1, 7-2 and 5-0, romping home to victory 45-26. In the placing matches Britain beat both Brazil and Egypt comfortably 45-26 to meet Ukraine for a fight off for ninth place. By the end of the sixth relay we were five hits up at 30-25 and never lost the lead, going on to a convincing 45-33 victory.

Germany, who had knocked out the favourites Italy in the quarter-finals, fell to France in the semis, but beat Poland for the bronze medal. The gold medal match was an enthralling contest, with France taking on China, world No. 2 seeds. The French were in fine form and after the fourth match led 20-15. But China fought back and Lei had a two-hit advantage going into the last fight 40-38. Le Pechoux was up for it and levelled the score at 44-all at time. Priority went to France. Lei, who had spent the fight searching for his opponent's blade and adopting a no-risk strategy, now changed tactics and started going direct. It worked. He scored the winning hit to win 45-44.

WOMEN'S FOIL

Britain had a comfortable first match against Puerto Rico, winning 45-16. But in the L16 they met Poland, ranked 4th in the world, and went down 16-34 at time. Expecting to face Canada next, it was a nasty surprise to find instead world No. 5 Germany, who had suffered an unexpected defeat against Canada 36-37. GB put in a strong performance to lead after the fifth fight, but ultimately lost 34-45. Beating Mexico 38-22 was a formality, but a further loss to China 16-30 put them into 14th place.

Predictably, the top two teams in the world, Italy and Russia, met in the final. Surprisingly, the Russians led 35-34 after seven fights. Then Di Francisca gave Italy a 2-hit lead going into the last fight, with the ice-cold Vezzali anchoring the Italian team. Korobeynikova was not intimidated, quickly levelling the score and then taking the lead 43-41. Vezzali struck back three times to go 44-43 up and the Italians were all but home and dry. However, Korobeynikova was not finished and forced the Italian back with extraordinary footwork control to equalise again at 44-all. Then, with an amazing parry-riposte to finish, she nailed the world champion to give Russia the title. It was one of the best women's team foil finals for several years and a great advert for the sport.

MEN'S EPEE

An interesting day full of upset and technical glitches ended with the medal matches. First up was the bronze match between Switzerland and South Korea. No fewer than five fights were called for non-combativity and then at 14-all in the last fight the fencers simply stopped fencing with more than 20 seconds left on the clock. Switzerland eventually won 15-14 in the priority minute of what can only be described as the dullest medal match ever.

The gold medal encounter between France, going for a record eighth consecutive world/Olympic title, and Hungary was rather more exciting. Closely fought from the start, Imre edged the Hungarians 35-34 ahead with two fights to go. But Lucernay and Grumier took control to give the French team a 45-37 victory and a record that may never be broken.

WOMEN'S EPEE

The British team knew they ought to win their first match against Hong Kong, but after six fights they were only 16-13 ahead. McGeever then came on for Albin in a fight that saw 26 hits scored in 3 minutes to put Britain 31-24 up. Usher and Lawrence saw it through for a 45-35 victory. Next up were the Romanians, ranked 1st in the world. They led from start to finish and won convincingly 45-

24. In the placing matches Britain faced the world No. 9, Russia, and put in a splendid display of grit and determination. Going into the last fight, they just trailed 35-36, but Sivkova put in a professional display against McGeever and Russia won 45-40.

The bronze medal match was filled with drama. The Italians led 21-18 after five relays, but in the sixth Duplitzer had a nasty fall and had to be stretchered off the piste with a worrying neck injury. Luckily, she was not badly injured and came back shortly before the match ended in Italy's favour 45-33. The gold medal match between China and Romania was an up-and-down affair with both teams leading at different stages. The final relay saw the Romanians ahead 20-17, but Li showed tremendous fight to battle back to 26-all at time. Alexandru was not to be outdone in the priority minute and with less than 30 seconds left scored the winning hit for Romania.

MEN'S SABRE

Russia, the No. 2 team in the world, had an uncomplicated path to the final, taking out Iran in the L16, Hungary in the quarter-finals and Germany in the semis. The surprise was that they met Belarus who came from behind in their semi-final against Italy to win 45-43. The final was a one-sided affair that saw the Russians walk away with the title 45-29.

WOMEN'S SABRE

Britain faced Australia in the L32 and led from the start, Sophie Williams completing a 45-33 win. The next match was the rather tougher prospect of Italy ranked fifth in the world. The Italians immediately went 5-2 up and the gap just widened. Chrystall Nicoll finished best of the bunch with a -2 indicator as the team lost 25-45. First up in the placing matches were Tunisia ranked just one spot below them at 13. An impressive start saw Britain leading 10-1 and then 30-16, Louise Bond-Williams closing it out at 45-26. Next was South Korea in the fight off for places 9-12. Britain were only a hit behind after six fights, but had dropped to four hits down by the ninth as the Koreans won 45-41. The fight for 11th place against Spain started badly, but GB recovered to go 35-33 up after the seventh fight before winning 45-35.

Surprise of the day were Azerbaijan, seeded 22, who knocked out the sixth seeds France 45-44 and then third seeds China 45-43 before going down to Ukraine in the semi-finals. They also gave the Americans a fright in the bronze medal match, collecting 40 hits before the USA finally won. The final between Ukraine and Russia saw-sawed back and forth, with the Russians taking the title 45-43. ■

The Story of Olympic Medallist Attila Petschauer (1904-1943)

It was interesting to read the article about National Socialism and Fencing in the last issue of *The Sword*. Sport, particularly fencing, was built into Nazi political strategy as propaganda and education for the younger generation. The article mentions one of the great Hungarian fencers, Attila Petschauer – individual sabre silver medallist and team gold medallist at the 1928 Olympic Games.

Petschauer's life and tragic death was dramatised in the 1999 film *Sunshine*, an epic story of three generations of the Jewish Sonnenschein family from the Austro-Hungarian Empire through the Holocaust to the Hungary revolution of 1956. Starring Ralph Fiennes, who plays the main role in all three generations, the film looks closely at the relationship between individuals and society. How they adapt to the ruling power and whether they can be happy under the actual political regime. What is more important in life, to be accepted by the regime or to keep one's own identity?


In the first part of film, Ignac, the first generation of the Sonnenschein family, finds himself in a moral dilemma affecting both himself and his family. A talented young lawyer, he accepts the rules of the monarchy and, because his name sounds Jewish, changes it to Sors – the word means Fate in Hungarian. This was so that he could take up a high position in the Supreme Court, even though he had to betray both his identity and his family roots.

In the second part of the film, Adam Sors, a celebrated fencer under the Hungarian-Nazi regime, also hides his Judaism. In order to compete at the highest level, he converts to Christianity, because no Jews are allowed in the top military fencing club. According to the film, he wins gold for Hungary at the 1936 Berlin Games. But, in the face of growing anti-Semitism, he finds himself facing the same moral question: which is more important, his sporting career or his identity and religion?

This part of the film combines the lives of two of the greatest Jewish Hungarian fencers, Attila Petschauer and Endre Kabos. The real hero of the Berlin Olympics was actually Kabos who won gold in both individual and team sabre events. However, Petschauer was not selected for the Games, although both he and Kabos had won Olympic gold four years earlier in Los Angeles.

Following the German occupation of Hungary during the last years of World War II, most Jews were arrested and sent to concentration camps. But Petschauer's reputation as a celebrated sportsman accorded him a special 'document of exemption'. One day in 1943, during a routine check of identification, he was arrested by the Hungarian police because he had left some of his papers at home.

Shortly after, Petschauer was deported to a labour camp in the Ukrainian town of Davidovka and, during a line-up of prisoners, was recognised by the commander of the camp. Taunted by the ill-educated and narrow-minded guards, he was told they were going to "make things hot for the Jew". One of his Olympic teammates, wrestling gold medallist Karoly Karpati, witnessed what happened next. "The guards shouted: 'You, Olympic fencing medal winner, let's see how you can climb trees.' It was midwinter and bitterly cold, but they ordered him to undress and climb up a tree. The amused guards ordered him to crow like a rooster and sprayed him with water. Frozen, he died shortly afterwards from hypothermia." This deep humiliation and brutality is vividly depicted in the film.

The life of Endre Kabos also ended in tragic circumstances. Following the start of World War II, he was arrested by Hungary's home-grown Nazis and sent to a labour camp, where he was kept captive for five months. But, with the aid of a compassionate guard, he escaped and joined the Hungarian underground. There are several versions of his

death, which occurred on November 4, 1944, the day before his 38th birthday. According to one report, he lost his life defending the Margit Bridge, which separates the cities of Buda and Pest. Another account claims he was killed when a munitions truck he was driving exploded as he attempted to drive across the bridge, plunging the truck and Kabos into the icy Danube. All the bridges had been mined by the Germans to stop the advance of the Russian army.

The beauty of *Sunshine* is Ralph Fiennes performance. He had no previous experience of fencing, but took lessons from Hungarian fencing masters and spent a lot of time practising in fencing clubs in Budapest and London. On top of this, he had to convert to fencing with his left hand. When you watch the movie, it is hard to believe that this man had never fenced before!

Fencers, who have competed in Hungary, may recognise the main hall of the national sports centre in Budapest as the location for the final of the 'Berlin Olympics'. They will also have had the opportunity of seeing the faces of many of Petschauer's 'teammates' and 'opponents', who were played by top Hungarian sabreurs of the present day. Perhaps those who see this production may understand some of the secrets of Hungarian fencing, and how this small nation has been able to win 33 Olympic fencing gold medals – 20 individual and 13 team. ■

An Interview with Coach Egor

Introducing Coach Egor, fencing's 'agony aunt'. In this interview with Paul Brenda, he answers frequently asked questions. Readers are invited to send in problems for Coach Egor to consider.

Where did you begin fencing and who was your inspiration?

My father was an outstanding swordsman. On dark nights he would take me into the cellars, lit only by a single candle, put a rapier into one of my hands and an empty wine glass into the other. With only the light of the candle to help me, I would have to lunge at the cork in a wine bottle, twist the blade and extract the cork, then catch precisely one glassful of wine before lunging again to replace the cork. I had to repeat this exercise until I had filled six glasses. In this way I learnt the basic principles of fencing and wine tasting.

When did you win your first competition?

I was too young to remember, but my father tells me that I showed such exceptional promise at such an early age that he did not believe it would be fair for me to compete against other, less talented, fencers. I therefore practised my skills informally.

Several people have asked about your qualifications.

I am proud to say that I have a full CRB record. I am a fully qualified member of the Veterans' Association and am the author of several works on fencing.

Where do you coach?

I give private lessons only, preferably over a period of at least six months. I am willing to travel to London for the season with my trainee or even accompany him or her abroad.

Do you recommend any particular diet or training regime?

I certainly do. I refer you to my books, *Coach Egor's Guide to Sports Dieting for Beginners* and *Coach Egor's Guide to the National Fencing Academy*.

How would you characterise your coaching technique?

Attention to detail. Many coaching courses omit such essential elements as the tactical placement of kit bags in the competition venue and modern etiquette in the shower room.

If you could have one wish, with regard to fencing, what would it be?

More inter-club challenges. Few clubs seem willing to give or accept challenges from other clubs yet it is just this sort of informal practice that most trainees need.

What do you see as the future of fencing in Great Britain?

My vision is to see a World Beating International Gold Fencing Centre of Excellence in every public school in Britain.

Do you think that there is a danger of fencing being seen as an elitist sport?

No. There is no danger in being elitist.

In your opinion, how could the BFA improve its services to members?

At the moment there are several gaps in the BFA's provision for its members. Properly remunerated professionals should be recruited to fill those gaps. Where, for example, are the Director of Piste Etiquette, the Director of World Beating Aspirations and the Co-ordinator of Directors of Importance?

What is the single most important piece of advice you would give to beginner, intermediate and elite fencers?

I give the same advice to all my trainees: "Think Egor!"

Are you looking forward to the 2012 Olympics?

Certainly. I have randomly selected seven of my trainees and invited them to buy elite Olympic training sessions.

Finally, Coach Egor, what advice would you give to those fencers aspiring to represent Great Britain in the Olympics?

Obituaries

RALPH EVANS (1949-2011)

Ralph Evans, who died of cancer on 3 September 2011, at the sadly premature age of 62, was a fine classical epeeist and a medieval historian of distinction. He was also someone whose untiring efforts were largely responsible for sustaining the Oxford Fencing Club over 34 years, eventually taking it to its present flourishing state. Born on 4 February 1949, he was the son of Nano, a primary school teacher, and Tom, a research scientist at Dunlop. When Ralph was 15, the family settled in Kenilworth. He was educated as a boarder at Shrewsbury School, where he excelled in history and languages and first learnt to fence. He went on to take a degree in history at Birmingham University.

A lifelong enthusiasm for the Middle East began when he backpacked round Syria with a school friend in 1969. During this trip they awoke one morning to find armed villagers surrounding their tent, accusing them of being Israeli spies. However, Ralph expressed his passion for Crusader castles so well that hostility was transformed to a welcome with open arms.

Meanwhile his fencing progressed. As a member of Birmingham Fencing Club, he was the West Midlands epee champion in 1971 and 1973, and in 1972 he won the Nottingham tournament. For some years he went up to London to the Polytechnic Club, where he was a pupil of the top-ranking coach Bela Imregi, while also representing Wales in the Quadrangular and in an international event in Copenhagen in 1975. That year he reached the top level of British fencing, winning the premier provincial Birmingham event and coming 6th in the final of the British epee championship. Always a model of classical technique, he was rightly described as having a "delicate elusive style" and used a French grip throughout his career.

In 1976 he retired from serious competitive fencing to give priority to family life, having married Georgina Poke, his Kenilworth next-door neighbour, in 1973. That year they had settled in Oxford, where Ralph worked on *The History of the University of Oxford*, writing and editing numerous other academic publications over the following decades. Although retiring from the top-line fencing, he turned his energies to developing the Oxford

Polytechnic Fencing Club.

Largely thanks to his efforts, the club (now simply Oxford FC) started to retain experienced fencers, as well as those new to the sport. A major expansion occurred in 2008 when Ralph negotiated the use of Rye St Anthony School's large new sports hall. The OFC now became a genuine three-weapon club, with three official coaches, a good deal of informal coaching and a remarkable proportion of members taking part in matches.

Although he had declined an invitation to join the Epee Club, Ralph often took part in the Club's Marmalade Trophy, held in Oxford, his high places demonstrating his continuing prowess against tough opposition.

Ralph was very much a man of principle. A firm atheist, his rationalist moral code was the foundation of his unselfish devotion both to the Oxford club and to his wife, his three children and three grandchildren. Though quiet and calm in manner and private by nature, he was friendly to all and always interesting to talk to, and within the circle of family and friends he was, as his family testified, "a loving, kind, brilliant and witty man whom everyone loved".

PIERS JONES (1943-2011)


Piers Jones was a modern-day Renaissance man in the wide range of his interests, abilities and achievements. He was a teacher, fencer, fencing coach, actor, violinist, organist and choirmaster, computer buff, businessman, traveller and bon-viveur, both practitioner and administrator in all of them. But it is his fencing career that concerns us here.

Piers started fencing as a student at Edinburgh University in the early 1960s, taught by Johnny Fethers, and joined the newly formed Stirling Fencing Club in 1967-8. Not content with that, he started a fencing club at Denny High School where he was principal teacher of English and took the Basic Coaching Certificate in foil in summer 1968, taught by the National Coach, Bert Bracewell. This bore fruit in the appearance of his pupils in the first Schools' Championships Week in 1969 and every year thereafter, winning over the years numerous titles and representation in Scottish schools' teams. When the Scottish Schools Fencing Committee was formed later in 1969, with Neil L'Amie at the helm, to manage all activity in schools' fencing, Piers was given control of the purse strings and he continued as treasurer for many years, while still finding time to take teams of school fencers to matches in Aalborg, Denmark. He was elected to the committee of Scotland's Central Section in 1974 and was its convenor 1975-82. Meanwhile fencing administration at the national level beckoned: in 1976 he acted as financial manager and armourer (he was quite technically minded as well) to the Schools Week and as arena manager for both the Schools Quadrangular Championship and the senior Quadrangular match between the home nations in 1977.

In 1977 Piers was awarded the Sword of Merit in recognition of his services as an officer of Central Section, treasurer of the Schools Committee, arena manager at the Quad and in various other capacities. This only spurred him on to further efforts: he served on the business committee of SAFU (Scottish Amateur Fencing Union, later Scottish Fencing) and as its

treasurer 1980-88, also serving as President of SAFU 1984-93, during which period Scotland won the Quad three years in a row for the first time. He was also co-opted as SAFU representative on the AFA Board. During this time he had moved to Wallace High School in Stirling as Assistant Rector, and promptly started a fencing club. His computer and printing skills enabled him to take over the initial production and typesetting of *The Point* (Scottish Fencing's magazine) revamped under a new editor.

In 1986 Piers acted as Chef d' Equipe to the Scottish team at the Commonwealth Games in Cardiff and the next year was awarded the AFA bronze medal for services to British Fencing. Commonwealth fencing opened a new door, offering a chance to indulge his passion for foreign travel and in 1990 he was elected President of the Commonwealth Fencing Federation, with his old friend Neil L'Amie as secretary, reversing their roles of 20 years before. He held this post until 2002. Piers was quite seriously ill for the last few years of his life, not that he let it hold him back much, but he maintained close contact with his fencing friends, old and not-so-old, to the end.



Review

Epée Fencing

When I received Steven Paul's book *Epée Fencing. A step-by-step guide on achieving Olympic Gold (with no guarantee you'll get anywhere near it)*, I was expecting yet another volume of familiar fencing actions with accompanying line drawings and/or photographs. What I found was a pleasant surprise. This was not so much a manual of every possible fencing action or pages of rehearsed movements between pupil and coach, but something quite different.

The book's layout is divided into three main sections: beginner, intermediate and advanced. Beginners are cleverly introduced to every aspect of epee fencing, apart from learning the basic movements, such as the importance of equipment choice and the safety requirements, with graphic reminders of what happens when blades break (I know. I was there in 1982 when Smirnov died).

This is an important area where many a beginner has no idea of what to buy and is confused by the range of products and manufacturers. Steven has kept the fencing actions in this section as simple as possible with the emphasis on correct execution and correction of mistakes.

Intermediate fencers are introduced to competitions, their format and what to expect. More advanced blade and fencing techniques are described, including the flick, prime, prise-de-fer, close-quarter fencing, foot hits and pommeling. Side 'clinic' boxes identify the next action, which is also accompanied by a photograph or two of the movement in action. Excellent idea. Fencers can also read about some extra fitness routines that they should include throughout their training.


The advanced section takes the reader into the realms of the international league and describes the commitment required if one is to make it to the top. I like the 'biogs' of international fencers in this section, all different in the way they train in order to reach their goals. No new moves are introduced; instead Steven describes the mental and physical toughness needed by top fencers. He looks at the psychological side of fencing and what a fencer should be thinking before, during and after a bout. His warnings of the time and money involved at this level will make many young fencers think twice about that Olympic dream.

The training plan shows the typical planning that every fencer needs and the extra tough fitness programme again highlights this. But that's what it can take to be the best. In conclusion: this is a very well thought out fencing book. One that clearly shows Steven's knowledge of the competitive fencing scene at national and international level, having been a top fencer himself.

If you are looking for a good coffee table book, this would suit you. I found myself going back and reading different sections over again and then just reading the 'clinic' sections another time.

Epée Fencing is published by Wellard Publishing at £18.99 and is available from Leon Paul, Waterstone's and online book sellers. ■

DERBY UNIVERSITY CLUB

Lately there do not seem to be many letters sent to *The Sword* with items of good news, so I thought your readers might like to hear of my recent experience involving a level of service which, I must say, really surprised me. I have set up a project to try to re-introduce a fencing club into Derby University, which once had high quality fencers, but the club had gone into decline and the sport of fencing was now largely unknown in their programme.

As with all student sport, a huge number of names of those interested in taking up fencing were collected at the Freshers' Fair and I was concerned that I did not have sufficient equipment for them all. A 2-hour class was scheduled for Saturdays but, as the term got going, some found that getting out of bed to come fencing was too much of a strain, particularly if there had been a good disco or party the night before.

The group whittled down to those who had a real interest and, as I was concentrating on epee, we soon needed a recording box. There was no budget for fencing and I thought I could use personal hit indicators that plug directly into the socket, but I was told by Leon Paul that these were no longer manufactured. I was then advised that the university was organising an open day for prospective students and parents and they would be coming to see fencers in action.

On the Tuesday evening before the open day, I attended a club where fencers used a small transmitter box which they carried in their pockets, with hits relayed to a recording box – the Hitmate system. As this was considerably cheaper than a conventional apparatus and I was personally footing the bill, I emailed an order and asked if I could receive the equipment before the following weekend. Not believing that there was any chance of this happening, I was delighted when my Hitmate was

dispatched almost by return and delivered by post on the Friday morning.

This is the level of service we should all expect but, so often these days, it is necessary to chase up orders several times only to be given promises which are never kept. So thank you Hitmate for your excellent service. The apparatus is performing very well and, as it comes packed in a carry case smaller than most laptops, it is easily transportable, a major consideration for those coaches who have to carry equipment from class to class. Fencing at Derby University is every Saturday 10-12 midday and is open to beginners or epeeists who would like to do some extra training.



FENCING AND FASCISM

Thank you for publishing Mark Barton and David Hall's article on the links between far-right politics and fencing. This should be seen as part of a wider cultural movement which associated individualistic sports with the extreme right: in Britain car-racing, mountaineering and aviation were also strongly associated with conservative and fascist politics. What all four sports supposedly shared was an emphasis on the Strong Man rising above (sometimes literally) the 'rabble' to demonstrate his 'superman' (*ubermensch*) qualities. As Barton and Hall point out, the ethos of sport has always been attractive to right-wing regimes; it's not very long since the presidents of several international sporting bodies, including the IOC, were open and official fascists, such as Juan Antonio Samaranch, formerly a minister in Franco's regime.

Although Barton and Hall's article concentrates on European fascism, there's an untold story about the strong links between the Amateur Fencing Association and the British Union of Fascists – a story unlikely to be told due to the destruction of the AFA's archives.

There's some consolation for the left-wingers amongst our community (including myself): Karl Marx was a fencer too. Sadly, however, he was an epeeist.

Round-Up

SUSSEX OPEN

This year's Sussex Open bucked the current trend and saw a resurgence in the foil, with numbers for the men's event being almost double that of 2010. This led to a fine display by some of Britain's top foilists particularly at the semi-final stage, with Sussex House's Tom Hendrie lined up against Cyrano's former Olympian James Beevers and young Alex Savin from Salle Boston against Crawley's Michael Questier. Hendrie kept pace with Beevers until the halfway mark when Beevers's experience began to show and he never looked back on his way to the final. In the other semi, best cadet Savin managed to triumph over best veteran Questier, but not without difficulty in what was a splendid match to watch. The final saw Beevers demonstrate his real class with a devastatingly accurate flick to back at a speed that few would find easy to counter; Savin fenced admirably, but there was to be no escape from a brilliant display of foil from Beevers.

The women's event saw a mixture of top cadets pitched against top veterans in an extremely hard-fought competition. In the semis Crawley's Sarah Steacy faced one of Britain's most successful veterans, Portsmouth's Jenny Morris. This was a high calibre match with Jenny using her skill and experience to win a place in the final where she met Crawley's Chiara McDermott, who had just overcome Boston's Ayesha Fihosy in a wonderfully nail-

biting semi. This set up a veteran versus cadet final that was fenced superbly, McDermott's youthful athleticism and superb lunging winning the day.

Jenny Morris was also in good form for the epee, lining up in the semis against City's Laycy Elys. Once again experience showed, with Morris making her way into another final after an excellent match against the talented Elys. In the other semi, Salle Gadaski's Christine Steiner had a tough match against Haverstock's Outi Nevala before winning through to the final, where she eventually took the title, relegating Morris to a second runner-up slot.

LTFC dominated the men's epee with only Portslade's Gregory St Claire-Jones able to break their complete domination of the medal table. LTFC team-mates Tom Bennett and Tim Buzwell lined up against each other in one semi, with Greg against LTFC's super-veteran Howard West in the other. Both matches were extremely close, with Greg and Tom reaching the final. What a treat this turned out to be, with both men matching each other point for point, demonstrating grace, athleticism and skill in equal measure and above all sportsmanship of the highest order. Tom eventually won by a point and fully demonstrated why he is one of Britain's finest fencers.

VETS NEWS

World Championships

Britain topped the medal table at the world championships in Porec, Croatia, with four gold, four silver and five bronze medals, ahead of the USA and Russia. Coming on top of an equally dominant performance at the European championships, this meant that GB finished the year as the most successful nation at veteran level.

That irrepressible duo, Graham Paul and Janet Cooksey retained their world titles. To win his 35-strong over-60 foil event, Paul beat former over-50 world champion Vladimir Chubarov (GER) 10-6 in the last 16, Eiichi Ide (JPN) 10-8 in the quarter-finals and Ray Sexton (USA) 6-5 in the semis before achieving a comfortable 10-4 victory over Brian Causton in the final.

Cooksey was No. 1 seed in her over-70 foil group of 15, but had a difficult fight in the semi-finals against Lia Saracino (GER), which she just won 10-9, before beating

another German, Barbel Gorius, more easily 10-4 in the final. She was also No. 1 seed in the epee event, beating Bettie Graham (USA) 10-7 in the semis and then edging to a narrow 10-9 victory over Marianne Hemplemann (GER) in the final. This was her tenth world title and brings her equal with Marie-Chantal Demaille of France with the most world championship gold medals.

Reigning European over-70 women's sabre champion Carol Wengraf won her first world title, dropping just one fight in a poule unique of nine to emerge ahead of teammates Silvia Brown and Connie Adam.

To win his silver medal, Brian Causton staged his usual recovery act from 20th seed, destroying the 4th seed Loero (ITA) 10-3 and No. 1 seed Takeishi (JPN) 10-5 before meeting his nemesis, Graham Paul. Richard Cohen also had to be content with silver after proceeding smoothly to the final where he met a newcomer to the over-60 sabre group, Wang Yung (USA), who won 10-7 to collect his first world title, having been a bronze medallist three times previously.

Clare Halsted won both silver and bronze medals in the over-60 category, claiming the scalp of multiple former world champion Demaille in the semi-final of the 26-strong foil event with an emphatic 10-4 victory before falling to the reigning world champion Kerstin Palm of Sweden 3-10 in the final. Her bronze came in sabre where she beat reigning European champion Silvia Earl 10-4 in the quarter-finals before losing to Ellen O'Leary 5-10 in the semis.

Sylvia Brown was runner-up in the over-70 sabre, winning six out of eight fights in the poule unique, in which Connie Adam won five to collect her first world medal and, at the age of 83, becoming the oldest medallist at the world championships. The other bronze medals were won by Kate Smith in the over-50 epee, Kate Elvin in the over-60 epee and Bill Osbaldeston in the over-70 epee.

FENCING AT PACKWOOD

At most schools, children get into trouble for starting fights, but Packwood children have been encouraged to start fights all over the country and have been winning plenty too. On Tuesday evenings, the Packwood sports hall is filled with cries of, "On guard, Ready, Fence," and the clash of swords as each point is fiercely contested.

Packwood Fencing Club has been running since current coach Nick Weston arrived 6 years ago and its ranks have swollen each year. Graduates of the club are now captains of fencing at Millfield and Shrewsbury Schools and another fences for Japan's cadets.

Soon after lunch, the knockouts started, with the finals being fought on the new piste. In addition to the fencing, we raised £200 for the Felix Fund, a bomb disposal veterans' charity. It was a truly amazing day. Packwood fencers are looking forward to starting more fights in 2012.

WIRELESS SCORING FOR YOUNGSTERS

A wireless scoring system for use with plastic swords has been introduced by a British manufacturer to keep children interested in fencing once they have learnt the basic moves. Known as Mini Hitmate, from the makers of Epee Hitmate, the equipment provides a traditional fencing experience for young novices. Hit duration timing, double hit timing and lockout are all built in.

"Once we tried it out," said a fencing coach, "the kids took to it with greater enthusiasm and commitment than the non-electric version. ...they loved it." The idea is that youngsters develop a feel for real hit timings, whether or not they are aware of it. This will benefit them when they progress to the next level.

Hitmate have tied in with the Italian plastic sword manufacturer, Nasycon, to supply the equipment through their established distributor network.
