NEW YEAR MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

I wish you all a Happy New Year. May you win when you don't expect to; may you smile through the bad decisions; and may the piste be with you. May you and I look forward positively. What are the milestones ahead?

From my perspective, I've been very conscious of fencers' concerns about various issues – the Board's leadership, our governance of the sport, the selection of Olympic Host Nation places and shortage of referees, to mention a few. I've done my Roadshows, taken the phone calls and mails, so have been able to communicate directly with many of you. We had an EGM and an AGM, both well attended, both with strong questions and comment. At Board and HO in 2012, we lost some old faces and gained new ones.

My daily concerns have remained pretty much the same. As regular examples, there's progress with the 3G strategy, Green, Grow, Gold; the Board and its restructure; finances; workforce development; the international scene; looking after our partners; giving members value for money – actually, pretty much the same things that exercised members' minds.

We are a sport that wants to grow and play a bigger part in the sporting scene in the UK; a sport with huge potential for enjoyment, for health and fitness, for challenging the individual mentally and physically; a rare sport that can attract men and women, girls and boys, who are not sporty; a sport with ten Olympic medals at stake every four years, more than some other Olympic sports. We are a sport that puts smiles on peoples' faces.

We are a governing body our members look to for leadership; a governing body with a big job to do: to change the record – of failing to win consistent medals and championships, of static growth in numbers.

How are we doing? As I write, there's a vote of confidence from our funding partners, Sport England and UK Sport. Both have increased their provision of funds for fencing in the next four years. A 60% increase from Sport England to £1.6 m and 22% from UK Sport to £3.08 m (and we are one of only two sports that have progressed from 'basic' to 'full' funding support). We have money increases against the trend in public finances and when other sports face cutbacks.

It's vital now that your governing body, British Fencing, takes these funding opportunities and responsibilities effectively and seriously. We can only do so with your support. Growing our numbers, building a Talent Pathway and producing world class fencers, all demand a team effort across the sport. The new Board – with 50% of

the elected directors replaced and the other 50% up for change in March, and a new CEO in place – has to lead and set an example.

The Board will be explaining the new plans agreed with Sport England and UK Sport, supported by our partners Beazley and the home countries, in the next few weeks. Do please listen and respond. Give us your views. I'm sure you will!

This New Year is also the starting point for the Board's new long-term plan. We propose ambitious goals for this great sport, for achievement by 2024. We will target real growth and achievement and status, by then. We want to be British and world leaders. Watch for the announcement – and again tell us what you think.

Is there yet a vote of confidence in British Fencing from you, the members? Not yet, not in all quarters. The new Board will get on with the job. It will be making its new case during this post-Olympic year, 2013. We will set our goals and milestones and work very hard to achieve them. We will work hard, too, to get the whole sport, in the spirit of 2012, working together.

The last thing to do is to say "thank you". Thanks from me and the Board to every member, volunteer, organiser, coach, referee, parent, supporter, administrator – every fencer. Without all of you, there is no British Fencing. Thank you. And let's go forward together.

SATISFACTION SURVEY

Sport England's 2012 survey of satisfaction from 46 sports puts fencing 31st in terms of overall satisfaction. The four most satisfying sports were listed as boccia, goalball, dance exercise (this is a sport?) and taekwondo.

In the past four years, overall satisfaction levels for fencing have increased from 78.8 in 2009 to 80.4 in 2012. Participants rated 10 factors for satisfaction and importance: performance, exercise &

fitness, release & diversion, social aspects, people & staff, ease of participating, facilities & playing environment, coaching, officials and value for money. Officials were considered the most important aspect of the sport, but second to last in terms of satisfaction, although showing the biggest increase in satisfaction rating since 2009. The most satisfying aspect of fencing was release & diversion followed by exertion & fitness and people & staff.


Of the 647 fencers who took part in the survey, 64% were members of British Fencing, although only 37% thought the membership fee offered good value for money, with 49% neutral.

CHANGES AT THE TOP IN WALES

Bob Turner has retired after 11 years as Welsh Fencing chairman, and 15 years as vice-chairman. He has had a distinguished career as a fencer, representing Wales internationally in the 60s & 70s, and continued to fence competitively until very recently, one highpoint being his silver medal at the Veterans World Championships in Johannesburg in 1995. "In my club, I fence with the world No. 2", one of his colleagues at Whitchurch Fencing Club was heard to say.

Founder of the Turner Cup, for intermediate men's epee, Bob received the BFA silver medal in 2006 and in 2011 was awarded a Torch Trophy for services to fencing.

Taking over from Bob is David Rees of Vale Fencing Club.

Alex Choupenitch of the Czech Republic beat Italy's Piero Franco 15-8 to win the 2012 Eden Cup junior men's foil World Cup tournament. The 143-strong event attracted fencers from 26 countries, with the 16 British representatives whittled down to just two – Kristijan Archer and Alex Tofalides – by the L32.

Tofalides won all six of his first round bouts to earn himself 6th seed and a bye through to the L64, where he overcame teammate Amol Rattan in a close fight 15-13 and then beat Schiavone (ITA) 10-7 at time to reach the L16. Archer started more slowly, winning only two of five to be seeded a lowly 83rd for the first round of DE. But he demolished Tsoronis (DEN) 15-1 and proceeded just as comfortably through the L64 by beating Khazbak (EGY) 15-3 before taking out Nemeth (HUN) 15-7 in the next round.

If both fencers had won their L16 fights, they would have met in the quarter-finals, which would have guaranteed a British medal, but it was not to be. After taking an injury timeout, Archer beat Doerr (GER) 15-11, but Tofalides fell to Matyas (HUN) 9-15, who went on to beat Archer 15-11.

Choupenitch had his closest match of the day in the quarter-finals against Chastanet (FRA), scraping through 15-14 before posting a comfortable 15-8 victory over Matyas in the semis. Franco had a harder fight against his compatriot Rosatelli, but came through 15-13.



A total of 369 fencers took part in the six individual events at the Beazley British championships held at the English Institute of Sport in Sheffield.

MEN'S FOIL

Rhys Melia became men's foil champion for the first time from a field of 78 fencers. He started the day well, winning all six of his first round bouts, including James Davis, to become fourth seed for the direct elimination. With a bye to the L32, he beat Andrew Chu 15-9, Peter Barwell 15-10 and Daniel Robinson 15-10 to make the semi-finals where, after a tough first period against Ahmed Rosowsky, he pulled away to win 15-10. In the final he took on 2010 champion Keith Cook and led 9-6 at the first break. Cook called for an injury time-out and, whilst he fought with his usual determination, was clearly struggling. Melia took the title 15-11.

ITALIAN FOILIST FACTORIES

Franco is astonishingly like Cassara in appearance as well as in style and approach and in his game. Even when he queries a decision, he copies Cassara's mannerisms. Do the Italians coach this? Other members of the strong Italian group were short and nimble. You almost began to suspect that the Italian federation is now selecting foilists to fit either the Cassara or the Baldini template, the one tall, powerful and statuesque, basing their game on reach, distance and timing, the other small, quick and technically articulate.

Watching them, I suddenly recalled a song Max Boyce used to sing about Welsh rugby teams and an imaginary factory hidden in a disused mine in the valleys which turned out an endless supply of top-class fly-halves, but sadly broke the mould after making Barry John. Obviously, the Italians would have two foilist factories: one for Model A, the statuesque Cassara/Aspromonte/Franco type (and Cerioni himself), secreted in a deserted part of the Carrara marble quarries, and another for the quick fleet-footed Model B, probably camouflaged as a research section of the Ferrari factory.

The Italians naturally brought with them a coach with a dominating presence, who was everywhere advising loudly during the action, arguing with referees and never being warned. In the best Italian tradition, he was always sure that his man had been wronged. In one DE round he raced almost the entire length of the hall to tell the referee precisely in what way he was wrong, despite not having seen what had happened. But he did not always get the last word. In the L16 when Nista lost to the eventual winner, the coach started arguing that the Czech had covered his target by ducking. He even pointed to people in the crowd, who he said would support him. By this time Janet Huggins and the referee supervisor had arrived and, after calmly listening to what had happened, Janet explained the difference between legitimate ducking and covering target. The coach, being Italian, chose to take this up again as she walked back across the hall and she dismissed him politely with "This is fine, this is not", now with almost balletic illustrative actions. It was exactly like someone dismissing a small but persistent child, absolutely finally but without hurting their feelings, and the actions were perfectly stylish. He was remarkably quiet thereafter.

TEAMS

As expected, the first teams from Sussex House and Salle Paul contested the final of the 13-strong men's foil team championship. Sussex House – Marcus Mepstead, Husayn Rosowsky and Tom Hendrie – were always ahead against the Paul trio of James Davis, Peter Barwell and Ben Peggs and, despite an 8-hit fight back at the end by Davis, won comfortably 45-35.

WOMEN'S FOIL

None of the London 2012 Olympic team attended the championship, giving the field of 49 fencers an opportunity to become national champion for the first time. Liz Ng battled her way to the title from third seed, beating Chloe Mullins 15-7, Chiara McDermott 15-14 and Lisa McKenzie 15-13 to make the semi-finals. There, a determined Catherine Cook took her to 12-all going into the final period before Ng squeezed through 15-13. She faced Ayesha Fihosy in a final that started slowly, with Ng leading 2-1 at the first break, but she pulled away to lead 6-1 going into the final period. Fihosy clawed back some hits by forcing the pace, but ultimately ran out of time with Ng taking the title 9-4.

TEAMS

The fight for medals produced the closest matches of all the team events. Edinburgh's Lisa McKenzie, Chloe Dickson and Catriona Sibert took on Anna Bentley, Liz Ng and Ayesha Fihosy from Salle Boston in the battle for gold. There was no more than one hit between them until the penultimate bout when Sibert pulled out a 7-4 lead over Bentley to put the Scots 31-27 ahead. McKenzie then held on in the face of a 6-3 fight back by Ng to give Edinburgh the slenderest of victories, 34-33, at time.

The bronze medal match was no less hard fought. Although Shetland were always ahead, Fighting Fit's Isabella Dmochowska, Katherine Beardmore and Angela Gould stormed back in the last three bouts to win 21 points and equalise at 44-all before Catherine Cook snatched the last hit for Shetland.

MEN'S EPEE

Dudley Tredger took his first men's epee title in a fast and furious match that was over in the first period. From a field of 97 fencers, he dropped one of his first-round bouts to start the direct elimination as 10th seed, going on to defeat Adam Gordon 15-11, Jonathan Bradley 15-14, Stephen Northam 15-6 and James Frewin 15-10 to make the semi-final. There he faced Christopher Taylor and beat him 15-12 before taking on David Gregory in the final. Gregory took an early lead, but Tredger levelled the score at 12-all, then 13-all. He scored a crucial single hit to go 14-13 up and then took the title on a double.

TEAMS

Nineteen teams entered, but the only question was who Haverstock would meet in the final. They cruised through their half of the draw, beating Oxford University 45-30 and then OPS (Oundle, Peterborough & Stamford) 45-28 in the semi-finals. Meanwhile, the other half of the draw self-destructed: Wellington Swords edged out the No. 2 seeds Redhill & Reigate 45-44 and then fell to Sheffield University 40-45. Haverstock barely broke sweat as they eased to a 45-21 victory in the final.

WOMEN'S EPEE

At the age of 40, Georgina Usher became the oldest women's epee champion and equalled Gillian Sheen's record of ten national titles. The day started with 58 fencers and Usher cruised through her poule fights to become No. 1 seed for the knockout stages. A bye in the L64 was followed by victories over Verity Howell 15-6, Sadie Greetham 8-5 and Hannah Lawrence 15-10 to reach the semi-finals. Caitlin Chang fought hard, but Usher led 9-8 going into the third period and then scored the last five hits in quick succession to win 15-9. In the final she took on Leonora Mackinnon and fenced with patience and thoughtfulness to pick her opponent off, taking the title 15-8.

TEAMS

Lansdowne's Georgina Usher, Julianna Revesz and Mary Cohen had little difficulty winning the team event, beating Reading 45-28 in one semi-final while Sheffield beat Truro 45-25 in the other. Then, after a slow start during which the score struggled to reach 6-1 after four fights, Lansdowne overwhelmed Sheffield 43-30 at time. Truro kept ahead of Reading to win the bronze 45-38.

MEN'S SABRE

From third seed, James Honeybone stormed through the men's sabre field of 58 fencers to win his first national championship. A bye was followed by victories over Richard Cohen 15-3, Fraser Ward 15-5, Rubin Amsalem 15-12 and Tom Mottershead 15-9. In the final he faced Soji Aiyenuro who scored the first two hits. This sparked Honeybone into action and he led 8-4 at the break. In the second period he was on the attack from the word go. His long flowing attacks saw him pull away and, despite a late rally from Aiyenuro, Honeybone took the title 15-10.

TEAMS


Brentwood gave Truro a fright in the semi-finals as they led 40-39 going into the last bout, but James Honeybone pulled them through, outpointing Alex Bela 6-2 and scoring a total of 23 points in the match. The other semi saw Camden dominate Imperial College 45-32. In the final Truro kept ahead of Camden to win 45-37.

MEN'S FOIL

In the Cat A men's foil, YE Ruyi of China successfully defended his title from Beijing by seeing off fellow countryman CHEN Yijun 15-5. From 4-all, YE won 11 of the next 12 points to claim gold. In the bronze medal match, Hungary's Richard OSVATH beat Damian TOKATLIAN (FRA) 15-7. YE had bounced back from losing to TOKATLIAN in the poules to beat the same opponent 15-8 in the semi-finals.

Another of China's defending Paralympic foil champions was also successful, as HU Daoliang beat world No.1 Anton DATSKO of Ukraine 15-10 in the final of the Cat B event. HU, the reigning world champion, also lost to a Frenchman in the group stages, Alim LATRECHE, but gained revenge with a 15-9 win over his European rival in the semi-finals. LATRECHE went on to beat Marco CIMA of Italy 15-11 for the bronze medal.

TEAM

The Chinese trio of YE, CHEN and HU went into the men's team foil open event (categories A & B) against France as world champions. CHEN and YE won the first two bouts to put China 10-1 in front and at this point the outcome looked a foregone conclusion. But TOKATLIAN beat China's Cat B champion HU 7-5 in the third bout and when Ludovic LEMOINE beat the same fencer 14-5 in the fifth bout, the French were back into the final at 23-25 behind.

However, Games debutant CHEN won all three of his bouts 5-1 and YE won his first two encounters 5-0 to push China further in front. When HU came out on top 5-3 in his match with France's Cat B LATRECHE, the Chinese led 35-26. They never looked back, racing away to win the gold medal 45-32.

In the quarter-finals, OSVATH gained revenge on CHEN for his defeat in the individual foil semi-finals, but China had pulled away from Hungary by the halfway point and won 45-29. Their next opponents, Italy, were hampered by an injury to CIMA and were beaten 45-19.

In the other half of the draw, France had a narrow two-point lead over Russia going into the last bout in which a 5-3 win for TOKATLIAN saw them make the last four with a 45-41 victory to set up a match with Hong Kong, who had beaten Great Britain 45-19.

In a nail-biting semi-final, France stunned the much-fancied Hong Kong by winning 45-41, with TOKATLIAN's 7-3 victory over WONG Tang Tat proving the difference between the two nations. Hong Kong then bounced back to beat Italy 45-42 to claim bronze.

With host nation places to make up a team, Great Britain (David Heaton, Craig McCann & Simon Wilson) lost to the No. 1 seeds Hong Kong 19-45 and then to Russia and Hungary to finish eighth.

WOMEN'S SABRE

Kira Roberts won her first women's sabre title from a relatively small field of 29 fencers. Top seed after the poules, she received a bye and then scored victories over Sarah Ellis 15-5 and Emily Ruaux 15-8 to face Helen Fairhead in the semi-finals. In her toughest fight of the day, Roberts was 6-8 down at the break, but fought back to win 15-13. In the final against Harriet Dixon she stormed to an 8-3 lead by the break. Dixon never gave up the fight, but the deficit was too great and Roberts took the title 15-8, finishing with two beautiful long attacks.

TEAMS

Like their male counterparts, Truro and Camden faced off in the team final, but this time the result was reversed as Camden's Joanna Hutchison, Alice Watson and Alexandra Carroll led from the start to win 45-32. Laszlo defeated Camden's B team 45-39 for the bronze.

WOMEN'S FOIL

In Cat A, Hong Kong's YU Chui Yee defeated WU Baili of China 15-13 for gold, while Hungary's Zsuzsanna KRAJNYAK overwhelmed compatriot Veronika JUHASZ 15-4 for the bronze medal.

In Cat B, China's YAO Fang overcame Gyongyi DANI of Hungary 15-10 in the final. Marta MAKOWSKA (POL) beat China's ZHOU Jingjing 15-14 for the bronze.

MEN'S EPEE

Poland's Dariusz PENDER bounced back from losing three of his group bouts during the morning session to win the title in Cat A. He overcame double European champion Romain NOBLE of France 15-9 to win the title, with the bronze going to Italy's Matteo BETTI.

In Cat B, defending champion HU Daoliang of China lost 9-15 in the quarter-finals to TAM Chik Sum (HKG), who went on to reach the final.

After beating eventual bronze medallist Alim LATRECHE of France 15-11 in the semi-finals, Jovane SILVA GUISSONE of Brazil trailed TAM by 11-13, but then scored four of the next five hits to take gold in dramatic fashion. The Brazilian said: "When the score was 11-13, I thought 'I have to do something'. I kept myself really calm, took some risks, attacked in the right way and I think this helped me to build the score to 14-all. At that point I thought 'I have to go for it' and I did. This victory is also for the disabled people in Brazil. I think it shows how capable disabled people are and what we can do in the sport. So I hope this encourages them."

WOMEN'S EPEE

In only the second final not won by China, Hong Kong's YU Chui Yee won gold in Cat A by defeating Hungary's KRAJNYAK 15-6. On her way to the title, YU beat China's WU 15-11 in the semis, in what was a repeat of the foil final. WU then went on to claim bronze after beating 46-year-old Alla GORLINA of Ukraine 15-11.

YU said: "This is my third gold medal at the Paralympics. My parents came here to celebrate with me. I wanted to share the gold medal with them."

In the Cat B, defending champion CHAN Yui Chong of Hong Kong had to settle for bronze after losing to Saysune JANA of Thailand in the semi-finals 14-15. JANA, who won bronze herself in the same event at Beijing 2008, then claimed the title after recording a comfortable 15-8 win over Germany's Simone BRIESE-BAETKE.

TEAM

The Chinese were forced to battle all the way to claim victory in the women's team epee open event, as YAO, WU and RONG Jing had to dig deep against some determined opponents. In the quarter-finals, they beat Russia 45-38

to set up a semi-final against Hong Kong. With two bouts remaining, Hong Kong led 35-34, but both RONG and WU scored narrow wins to help China to a 45-42 victory.

In the other half of the draw, KRAJNYAK produced a strong performance to help Hungary edge out France 45-41 in their quarter-final clash to set up a semi-final against Poland, who had seen off Ukraine 45-28. After seven of the nine bouts, the scores were locked at 33-all, but KRAJNYAK's 5-1 victory in the last match ensured Hungary ran out 45-40 winners.

KRAJNYAK continued in impressive form in the final, winning the second bout by a nine-hit margin to put Hungary 10-2 ahead, but WU immediately responded with a 13-3 victory and from there the Chinese never relinquished the lead as they recorded a 45-38 triumph to clinch gold. The bronze medal went to Hong Kong after they recorded a comfortable 45-26 victory over Poland.

Although Great Britain (Gemma Collis, Gabby Down & Justine Moore) were overpowered by Hong Kong 45-26 in the quarter-finals, 14-year-old Gabby beat individual gold medal winner YU Chui Yee 6-5 to give hope for the future.

MEN'S SABRE

China's CHEN saw off countryman TIAN Jianquan in a thrilling Cat A final. TIAN looked in superb form after beating eventual bronze medallist CHAN Wing Kin of Hong Kong 15-4 in the semi-finals, but in the final it was CHEN who edged in front and held on for a 15-12 victory to add gold to the silver medal he collected in the men's foil. CHEN said: "My main tactic was to be flexible in my upper torso. I feel a bit spoilt with all the attention. The service from the Gamesmakers, judges and everyone else has been great."

Earlier in the day, Greece's Gerasimos PYLARINOS had emerged from the pool stages as the number one seed after winning all four of his bouts, but he then lost 6-15 in the quarter-finals to Poland's Radoslaw STANCZUK. The Pole went on to lose 8-15 to CHEN in the semi-finals and then lost to Hong Kong's CHAN 9-15 in the battle for the bronze.

In Cat B, Poland's Grzegorz PLUTA claimed gold with a 15-8 win over Frenchman Marc-Andre CRATERE in the final. CRATERE had beaten Marat YUSUPOV (RUS) 15-13 in his semi-final, but was no match for 37-year-old PLUTA in the decider.

"I was very relaxed going into the fight," said PLUTA. "The worst for me were the quarter-finals and semi-finals, but after I got through those bouts, I just felt inner peace and all went well."

Italy's Alessio SARRI won bronze with a 15-7 victory over YUSUPOV. "I got fifth place in Athens, fifth place in Beijing and now, here in London, I finally got a medal. So I'm very happy", said SARRI.

Delivering Paralympic Fencing

Paralympic wheelchair fencing was far more complex than Olympic fencing to manage. Four events were run through to completion on each of the first two days, on only eight pistes. The competition hall and the training hall were in different arenas, and there was the logistical complication of moving competition wheelchairs on a daily basis between the Paralympic village and the two arenas in use.

However, it was also more relaxed and friendlier. Bouts and matches were fought just as fiercely, but there was a real family feeling among the competing nations.

The atmosphere in the wheelchair fencing arena was terrific, with spectators coming daily in large numbers. They were hugely supportive and very vocal, sometimes shrieking their support for the fencers in front of them. There was excellent exposure in the national press, with impressive photo coverage in the *Guardian* and *Daily Telegraph* in particular. The *Daily Mail* highlighted wheelchair fencing as their Sport of the Day, and there was also more television coverage than ever before. Wheelchair fencing has certainly moved on.

Day tickets were available for ExCeL, which allowed spectators to roam freely between the five arenas, and wheelchair fencing proved the 'must see' event.

Video-refereeing was used for the first time and inevitably wireless will follow before too long. There was also more awareness of presentation and the importance of the spectators.

We paid a great deal of attention to getting the back-of-house and field-of-play processes running smoothly:

- Separate back-of-house areas were established for assembly – with a separate area for each event rather than just the one Call Room (particularly useful when three events are beginning at exactly the same time). This worked very well, and the athlete entry procession at the start of each bout or match was always dramatic and impressive.
- Athletes' equipment was taken out in advance to the athlete pens on the platform and placed at the side of the piste, out of view of the spectators, and under the care of the piste armoureur.

- A well trained team of volunteers was based on each piste, ready to set the competition chairs into the frames, and adjust them to the appropriate distance.

There were a number of challenges to overcome. For example:

- ExCeL hosted six Paralympic sports in five arenas, which meant that two sports had to use the same arena. The wheelchair fencing arena – North Arena 2 – was first used for Paralympic judo, which gave us only two days transition time to build or convert to the required wheelchair fencing facilities. These included:
 - the competition arena, complete with pistes and wheelchair frames, scoring technology, video-screens, technical tables, athlete pens, photographer pens, TV camera positions, wheelchair ramps and fencing-specific decor
 - the back-of-house facilities including the warm-up area, call room and assembly areas, the referees call room, a second weapon control room, storage facilities for day chairs, competition chairs and kitbags, information desks, etc
 - fully equipped suites of offices for competition management and the two international federations.

The time required for this meant that we were the only Paralympic sport with no realistic opportunity for the necessary on-site rehearsals.

- Having inherited the dimensions of the judo arena and the raised platform for the athletes, wheelchair fencing found the competition hall perimeter slightly too small.

This resulted in initial difficulties placing coaches where they could observe their fencers.

- The seating bowl in North Arena 2 required us to run the wheelchair fencing event on a large platform accessed by ramps. Arrangements therefore needed to be made during the preliminary pools to allow fencers access to their day chairs when required, without disrupting the schedule.
- It was not possible to suspend the scoring plasmas from the ceiling (as for fencing in South Arena 1) and this severely restricted the number of spectator seats available during the wheelchair fencing finals sessions. Athletes' competition chairs and kitbags needed to be transported regularly from the Paralympic Village to the venue and vice versa, as it was not possible for athletes to take them on the buses.
- With the competition venue in North Arena 2 and the training venue and weapon control in South Arena 1, athletes' competition chairs and kitbags needed to be moved from one arena to the other on a daily basis. This needed to be done manually overnight, once all the public had left ExCeL, as the only transfer route was across the central walkway used by all five arenas.

All these challenges and more were overcome through the determination, hard work and flexibility of the various teams involved. The result was that the competition ran well throughout and absolutely to schedule. It was pleasing to get positive feedback from both IWAS (International Wheelchair & Amputee Sports federation) and IWFC (International Wheelchair Fencing Committee), who both expressed themselves delighted with all aspects of the event. What was also important was the feedback received direct from the fencers, many of whom took the trouble to offer their thanks and say that, as athletes, they had never been treated so well.

There is now a real legacy for wheelchair fencing in terms of Great Britain's ability to stage a major international competition. We have a large number of trained people (including organisers, frame-handlers, referees and armourers), numerous items of additional equipment, and a significant increase in exposure and interest.

As with the Olympic fencing event, wheelchair fencing had the benefit of a fantastic band of people – the LOCOG fencing team and numerous volunteers, armourers and referees. Many of these people, having participated at the test event and the Olympics, were reporting for duty for the third time and they put in the same committed and enthusiastic performance. On behalf of LOCOG and wheelchair fencing – thank you again to everyone.

Interview with Hilary Philbin

London 2012 Fencing Manager Hilary Philbin looks back at the Games in conversation with Malcolm Fare

How do you feel with the Games now behind you?

Both satisfied and relieved. I was pleased to get the job and to do it, but now I'm also pleased to have finished the job. It took over my life for several years. I stopped fencing altogether (the only exception being an annual visit to the Vets Age Group event), I neglected my family and friends, and any thought of a non-working holiday was completely abandoned. However, as many people have commented, it was truly a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and one that I wouldn't have wanted to miss.

When I took on the job, I was very conscious of having a responsibility – not only to British Fencing and the FIE but also to the thousands of individual fencers who want to feel proud of their sport when it's on display to the world. If it all went pear-shaped, I would have been letting down a huge number of people.

I'm happy to say that it seemed to go well from all points of view – athletes, spectators and the many organisations involved. I get a great sense of satisfaction when I hear fencers say that they and their non-fencing guests were thrilled by what they saw.

What were your main objectives when you started out?

Apart from the general aim of delivering an event of which people would be proud, I had a three-in-one objective: to get the processes, people and presentation right. It made a nice simple label to carry around in my head – the three 'P's.

As a project manager, I'm used to establishing efficient and effective processes, and as a competitive fencer I've often observed that the processes at some fencing events could be improved. For the Olympics in particular, with its wide television coverage, timing is very tight indeed – to a precise second. This reinforces the need for identifying and documenting every process in minute detail, including the time, space and people requirements. The painstaking work undertaken by the LOCOG fencing team was rewarded by a smooth operation that ran to time.

On the people front I was determined to include as many fencers as possible, both in the 12 paid roles and the 300 fencing volunteers. I also negotiated with LOCOG

departments who had their own volunteer teams in the fencing hall (eg technology, announcers and anti-doping), which enabled me to place fencers in the key roles in their teams too. This had two main benefits – the huge amount of fencing knowledge gathered together helped the events to run well, and the additional experience gained by all delivered an element of legacy to British Fencing. The FIE acknowledged that this high level of expertise contributed to the successful running of the events.

Last but not least, I identified the presentation of the event as all-important from the start, following my conversations with the FIE's Ian Pop while in Beijing for the 2008 Games. From a personal point of view I have always believed that fencing is visually an exciting and potentially glamorous sport, and that it can be 'sold' to a non-fencing audience if presented well. Much has already been said and written about our approach to the presentation of fencing, and the lighting in particular. Suffice it to say, after a long struggle and many ups and downs, I was delighted with the final outcome.

Thanks to a lot of effort from a lot of people, the 3 'P's worked out well.



Pre-Games work wear

What personal achievement pleases you most?

I couldn't pick just one. I've got a mixed bag of quite different things. One would certainly be providing the 'glue' to join together the various elements that resulted in the lighting system. There were many times in the 2-3 years leading up to the Games when the floor lights and/or theatrical lights looked most unlikely to happen. I felt quite like a bulldog. I had to get my teeth into it and just not let go. But getting the central control boxes built at the 11th hour, enabling the floor lights to be integrated with the theatrical lights for presentation purposes, is probably the most significant item.

I fought hard to get the 23 armourers re-classified as Technical Officials (similar to the status of referees). This not only gave the armourers the appropriate accommodation, meals, uniforms, etc, but also the well deserved recognition for their technical skills and overall contribution. This classification, having been made, is likely to remain in place for the future.

I was also pleased that I was able to create a fencing-specific scheme for a group of our top junior and cadet fencers to get access to the Olympic fencing events. This enabled 24 fencers aged 16-17 to become Young Games-Makers, taking on piste assistant roles in the competition hall and warm-up halls. It also allowed them to watch the world's top fencers at close quarters, and hopefully will inspire them to follow in the footsteps of today's Olympic stars.

What were your favourite moments?

There were quite a few. I enjoyed all the 'first' moments on Day 1 of the fencing – the first athlete entry with the first view of the lighting effects, the start of the first fight, the first final and the first medal ceremony. Everything went well, and it felt good to see the results of 2-3 years of meticulous planning and preparation.

In terms of the fencing itself, there were so many favourite moments:

- Supporting the men's foil team in their exciting match against Italy, with a great performance from our team, and James Davis whipping up the crowd
- Sharing the pleasure of the Venezuelan gold medallist at men's epee and the Egyptian silver medallist at men's foil
- Admiring the technical expertise shown by the Korean team at all weapons

In the wheelchair fencing events what impressed me most was the genuine respect, friendship and support shown by fencers to their opponents. It really was a pleasure to watch.

Of course it was also a hugely satisfying moment at the end of the very last medal ceremony for wheelchair fencing, when I could breathe a sigh of relief that all had gone well throughout both fencing and wheelchair fencing.



Carrying the torch in Athens

What would you single out as a personal highlight?

In May I was fortunate to be invited to run with the Olympic torch in Athens. The torch is carried over a period of 8 days on a 1865-mile journey (3000 km) from Mount Olympus to Athens. My particular section was at the foot of the Acropolis, prior to the torch being carried into the old Olympic stadium for the official handover ceremony to London. That was a magic moment and a very personal souvenir.

Would you describe the Games as a learning experience?

Well, I'm definitely older and wiser. It's been an eye-opener to see just how much is involved with the Olympic and Paralympic 'machinery'. I fully expected it to be complex and time-consuming with its fair share of problems, and I wasn't disappointed in any of those respects.

For me, the main learning experience was wheelchair fencing. I hadn't seen much of it before my involvement with London 2012, so I had to get up to scratch quickly. I was pleased that the British Disabled Fencing Association were able to send me out to an international competition in Italy in 2010, which got me off to a flying start.

In addition, I acquired a lot of knowledge in a number of unexpected areas. I spent a lot of time working closely with various aspects of venue management, and I hadn't predicted that I would spend quite so much time in a hard hat and protective clothing. Lighting has also become a familiar topic – broadcast lights, theatrical lights, house lights, rigging, filters, hot switching, etc – and I know more than I ever wanted to know about accreditation. It could be my specialist subject on Mastermind!

Were there any disappointments?

There were none related to the fencing events themselves. However, one personal disappointment was that, with the early starts and late finishes, it wasn't possible to follow what was going on in other sports. I'd have liked to see some of the fantastic performances at London 2012, and in particular those from the GB team.

Also, I would have liked to catch up with the numerous 'blasts from the past' in the GB fencing world. At one time or another there were visits to ExCeL from Mildred Durne (GB women's team captain from my competing days), former team-mates Fiona McIntosh, Ann Brannon and Linda Strachan, former GB team captains Richard Oldcorn and Allan Jay, numerous appearances of other GB internationals across all weapons and ages – and even one from my former PE teacher at school.

What next?

I haven't thought about that yet. Although I left LOCOG at the end of September, there were a number of loose ends that kept me occupied for some time. I'll probably look for another project, but I've parked all thoughts about the future until the New Year.

I'm very much looking forward to the return of normal life, and I hope to stay involved in some way with both fencing and wheelchair fencing. I've also got half an eye on Rio in 2016, possibly as a volunteer – but maybe just as a spectator!

Wyatt Earp Rides into Town

You know how it plays. A lone gunslinger, maybe a killer for hire or a soon-to-be-appointed sheriff, rides into a Western town where lawlessness is rife, the local people desperate, and no one able to impose order or security. Soon the villains are vanquished, the body count has grown, and our hero is saddling up once more, off toward his next showdown.

If anyone deserves such a comparison, it is Peter King, who last October stepped into the boots of Piers Martin as CEO of British fencing. In 1997, King took up a similar position with British Cycling, a sport where failure at world and Olympic level had become endemic. The national federation was in a hapless state, over £100,000 in debt and with membership at 13,000, its lowest-ever level. But by the Beijing Games in 2008, our cyclists were winning 14 medals, eight of them gold. Four years on, the tally was another eight gold, two silvers and two bronzes – along with Britain's first-ever winner of the Tour de France.

King was always very keen on sport, "although not very good at it". A bit of a cricket nut, his superhero was Godfrey Evans, the Kent and England wicketkeeper. Cycling was his main sport, though, and he did take part in one national competition, a 24-hour nonstop race where each cyclist had to pedal as far as they could. He clocked 376 miles – and won a medal.

After school, King took a correspondence course in accounting, and went on to set up his own practice over 30 years ago. He and his wife Judi have two sons, Richard (41, and a keen cyclist), Matthew (40) and a daughter, Sarah (36). Life was full but nothing out of the ordinary, until what he calls "a complete freak coincidence".

"For the 50th anniversary of the club I used to ride for, I agreed to take part in a charity race, but for that I needed a new bike, so I visited Box Hill [which featured prominently on the cycling route for last year's Games], which is close to my home in Guildford. The owner, knowing I was an accountant, asked me to look at the figures of the British Cycling Federation – he was the auditor for the local division – and offered in return a big discount on a new bike."

King duly checked the accounts and got his bike, then was asked by the club to attend the AGM of British Cycling

on 2 November 1996, "where I was instructed to ask as many awkward questions about the accounts as possible. Everyone at the meeting realised that they had been ripped off, and the whole Board got fired. I was asked to join the committee to sort things out."

Sport England wanted an accountant to oversee the Federation, so for two months he worked for British Cycling for a couple of days a week. "The Board soon made my position permanent, and I found myself CEO, working there three days a week but otherwise continuing with my own firm. I remained for twelve years."

The state of British Cycling was not only as low as it possibly could have been: Sport England had stopped its funding, and on the international results table Britain was ranked near the bottom. "We put the fees up 25%, restructured the organisation, encouraged members pay their dues five or ten years in advance to demonstrate support, and at the next AGM we got a standing ovation." All of this is recounted without either false modesty or bragging, just setting out the record.

When in 1997 lottery funding arrived, King applied for half a million pounds for a performance director and staff. The money was granted. "Our first director was Peter Keen and we had to decide what we wanted to do to motivate ourselves. We settled on being the best in the world and getting to 100,000 members! The Board said we should go away and come up with something more sensible. But they backed us in the end, and by the Sydney Games we had a gold." Peter Keen then moved on (to work for Glaxo), but before he went recruited Dave Brailsford to take his place. "Peter was more of an academic coach, who introduced the art of scientific analysis of performance. Dave has been more of a motivator – the conductor of the orchestra. He came on board just before Athens, and steered us to success there and even more success four years later in Beijing. In 2012 we passed 60,000 members." The last piece of icing on the cake was getting Sky sponsorship in 2008.

It is an extraordinary story, and one wonders what qualities made King and his team such a success. Ruthlessness? "I don't think that's the right word: we were very focused. But then we were in such a bad state we could have gone only one way."

Even so, being a good accountant is one thing, picking the right people and managing them is another. "It's not been about what I do, but the people I employ. My job has been to motivate and inspire. I attended all the major cycling events, but had little to do with the national team. Part of my job was to protect Peter and Dave from people who might have wanted to do things differently. I don't do bad government or mismanagement. Doing things properly is to everyone's advantage. You need diplomacy, occasional intervention – and trust. Respect the people you have working for you, take them into your confidence, and value them."

King finally stood down as CEO in 2008, but at British Cycling's invitation he stayed on as 'executive director', working for them two days a week. In the autumn of 2009, Modern Pentathlon, which had just parted company with their CEO, asked him to take over on a short-term contract, from that November till April 2010. "I'd have liked to have been with them longer. To be honest, we kept the ship afloat, tidied up some of the practices, but it was very difficult to do anything truly constructive. But with fencing, I'm very optimistic."

Toward the end of 2011, he was asked to prepare a report on BFA's head office. It was then but a short step to his being asked to take over as CEO, again on a six-month contract. With him comes his long-term assistant, Penny Moseley, who has worked with him for 23 years and, as a qualified accountant herself, shares much of his working burden.

A few days before interviewing Peter King, I spoke with BFA's chairman, David Teasdale, who describes his job as, in part, trying to reconcile two warring factions within the current Board: those who accept Piers Martin's style of management and those who oppose it. Did King agree that there was such a problem? "That may well be the case", he told me. "But we're all on the same side here, and there's only one winner. I want that to be British fencing. Conflict is self-defeating. My business management style is to give people the space to do the job. I want to sit down with the Board and see what their role is, so we clearly understand who does what."

The Board will be asked to define strategy while the main operating officers implement tactics and oversee the day-to-day running of the sport. With such a division of responsibilities, isn't there a danger of the Board being sidelined? "Well, we can't have Board members getting involved in decisions off their own bat. My priorities are fairly clear. By the end of March I want a robust structure from the staff and executive point of view, delivering good things for the sport. We had a staff meeting on 5 November, and it went very well."

One strength of the new management team, King believes, is that he's known David Teasdale for over ten years during the latter's previous incarnations as a consultant (although they've never had a business or other relationship), and Piers Martin for nearly six years, while they were each chief executives in different sports. As for the current performance manager, Alex Newton, "Oh gosh – all the way back to the beginning, say 1997, when she was at the Sports Council."

But none of the four has ever fenced. Might there be a weakness in such inexperience? King doesn't think so. "When I was made CEO of British Cycling people would say to me, 'So you've come into this job because you are a cyclist?' And my answer was I came into it because I was an accountant and a manager, who just happened to have cycled. Anyway, I always want my Board to be stuffed full of experienced fencers."


The argument that good managers in our chairmen and CEOs do not necessarily have to be ex-fencers is a fair one, but the performance manager's brief is different and would seem to require a knowledge and understanding of both fencing and fencers.

Here King is adamant. "Performance managers aren't there to be coaches, to be technical people. I have no problem at all with a performance manager who is not a fencer, and I'm comfortable with what Alex is doing. Do you want a performance manager who's the best coach in the world? I think you want the best manager who then brings in the best coaches – that's the model that seems to deliver the best results."

My final question went back to his time at Modern Pentathlon. King will be working at fencing HQ just two days a week, and then only for six months. He also sits on the boards of the European Regions Airlines Association, England Athletics, British Cycling, The Sport and Recreation Alliance and Sport and Recreation Ventures Limited. Does he worry about spreading himself too thin?

King laughs. "I'll rise to the challenge. I'm very optimistic about it, actually. I think British Fencing can grow bigger and better. I'm acting and behaving as if I'm going to be here much longer than six months – as if I'm here permanently."

Is that a possibility? He pauses. "That's not in my plans at the moment. I'm a contract animal now."

Fencing with Death

*Of the many stories of heroism in World War Two, one of the strangest is that of Paul Anspach, the Olympic fencing champion who defied one of the Third Reich's most notorious figures in a bizarre duel of wits. This article, written by spy novelist Jeremy Duns, was first published in 2005. An earlier account appeared in Richard Cohen's book *By the Sword*, 2002.*

Paul Anspach was born in Brussels in 1882. His uncle had been mayor of the city and his grandfather governor of the national bank. Paul, who qualified as a lawyer, was a keen footballer and tennis player until he discovered the sport that would dominate his life: fencing. After becoming national champion, the 26-year-old travelled to London for the 1908 Olympics, where his team won bronze. But it was at the Stockholm Games in 1912 that he secured his place in fencing history, winning gold medals in both the individual and team epee events.

The two top fencing nations, France and Italy, had withdrawn from the Stockholm Games in protest at different rules imposed by the organising committee. Anspach realised that for the sport to progress it needed its own governing body. The fact that he was the best epeeist in the world and spoke fluent French, German and English helped him make contacts across the continent, and in 1914 he became Secretary General of the newly formed International Fencing Federation (FIE). Five years later, he and the Marquis de Chasseloup-Laubat set down the rules that remain the basis for all competitive fencing today.

Anspach competed in a further two Olympics, winning silver in both, before deciding to concentrate on his law career and the administrative side of the sport. He rented a house in Rue de la Victoire, Brussels, and moved in with his second wife and their six children. In 1939, he was elected president of the FIE for a second time: his tenure was due to run until the end of 1940, but the war suspended the organisation's operations.

On 27 May 1940, Belgium surrendered to the Nazis. In the preceding days, several Germans had been murdered near Brussels, and the occupiers rounded up suspects, including Anspach, who was a military prosecutor. He was imprisoned for a week and cleared of any involvement in the murders. However, his position as head of the FIE was noted and included in the report sent to Nazi Party headquarters in Berlin.

The report reached Obergruppenführer Reinhard Heydrich. Head of the Sicherheitsdienst, the internal security section of the SS, Heydrich was widely considered Hitler's likely successor. He had won the Iron Cross for 60 flying missions, and was a brilliant swimmer, sailor, tennis-player, equestrian and concert-level violinist.

His greatest passion, however, was fencing. With its carefully controlled violence, elegant costumes and rigid code of honour, the sport appealed to many Nazis and fascists: Benito Mussolini and Oswald Mosley were also fanatical about it. Heydrich was an excellent sabreur – but not quite good enough to make the German Olympic team, despite several attempts. When he realised he would not succeed at the highest level as an athlete, he turned his attention to the governing of the sport. As war raged across Europe, Heydrich spent much of his time manoeuvring to become president of the German Fencing Federation. When he read the report on Anspach, he saw the chance to grab a greater prize – and made his first move. He sent the Gestapo back to Rue de la Victoire.

The only person in the house was the nanny, Edith Neufeld. Anspach's wife Marguerite was visiting her mother in Aachen and the children were at school. Neufeld was a 22-year-old half-Jewish German who had fled Berlin for Brussels in 1937. "There were three or four of them", she said. "They were in plain clothes, but I recognised them from when they had arrested Monsieur Anspach the week before: Gestapo. They said they needed everything in the house to do with fencing. What could I do? They went into his study and took everything. Then they left."

As president of the FIE, Anspach kept all the organisation's records, archives and diplomas. The entire collection was now transported to Berlin. On hearing of the theft, Anspach, still in prison, immediately wrote a letter to Hans von Tschammer und Osten, the Reich's sports minister, to demand that the files be returned. Von Tschammer und Osten sent a reassuring reply – but nothing happened.

Heydrich immediately counter-attacked, inviting the head of the Italian federation, Giulio Basletta, to Berlin. At a gala dinner on 6 March 1941, Heydrich told Basletta he thought it was time they took over the running of the FIE. In a letter written to FIE members after the war, Basletta claimed that he tried to counter Heydrich's proposal, but that his German had been too weak.

Heydrich then wrote to Anspach. "I agree with Giulio Basletta", he wrote, "that during the war it is I and he who will protect the FIE's interests. The question of the next presidency can be resolved after the war."

But once again, Anspach refused to give up his post, and cleverly used Heydrich's argument against him, pointing out that as he did not have any

of the official documents of the federation, he was hardly in a position to hand over the reins. Heydrich did not reply, perhaps because he had more pressing matters to attend to: a month later, Hermann Goering authorised him to make preparations for the implementation of the 'final solution to the Jewish question'. Heydrich was responsible for everything from the mobile death squads to the transport of Jews to the camps. Ten months later, his car was ambushed by Czech agents in Prague and he was assassinated.

In December, Heydrich achieved his ambition and became head of German fencing. This prompted his next move, which was to send the Gestapo back to Anspach, requesting that he come to Berlin. "His friends warned him not to accept any cigarettes Heydrich offered him", said Neufeld. "In case they were poisoned."

Anspach arrived in the German capital in the first week of February 1941. He took a hamper to Neufeld's mother, who still lived in the city, and she drove him to the Kaiserhof, a luxury hotel that the Nazis were using as a base. Anspach and Heydrich's meeting lasted several hours. The German argued that Berlin was a better home for the federation's documents, as the city was the communications centre of Europe, and pointed out that Anspach's tenure as president of the FIE should theoretically have expired two months previously. The Belgian replied that the federation's activities were in suspension because of the war, and that he would remain the leader until it was over, after which a new leader could be appointed. Heydrich parried by suggesting that Anspach do the decent thing and hand over the reins to him.

Not many people would dare say no to the Obergruppenführer's 'invitation', but Anspach did just that, and for good measure reiterated that the organisation's archives should be returned to him. Although Heydrich was one of the most powerful men in the Third Reich and could easily have had Anspach either imprisoned or executed, he agreed to let the Belgian return to Brussels, on the condition that he was accompanied by two SS officers. Why Heydrich did this is a mystery, but perhaps he was saving harsher measures as a last resort: if he could 'honourably' take over the fencing world, so much the better.

On 17 February, one of the SS officers turned up at Anspach's house in Brussels, armed with a letter stating that he would relinquish his presidency of the FIE to Heydrich, and asked him to sign it. Anspach asked the SS officer for 24 hours to consider his reply. The next day, he wrote an extraordinary letter that is now in the fencing museum in Brussels. "As I am mandated by thirty-seven national fencing federations", he wrote, "nothing can permit me to abdicate my powers to one affiliate."

After the war, Anspach bought the house in Rue de la Victoire, divorced Marguerite and married Edith Neufeld. She was 35 years younger than him, "but it never felt like that", she said. "We grew close as a result of what happened during the war. It's true that he could be sharp, but he never was with me. He was only ever kind."

Anspach tried to recover the federation's archives, but the building they were housed in had been burned to the ground during the war. He was re-elected president of the FIE, a post he held until 1948, and the organisation awarded him its highest honour, the Challenge Chevalier Feyerick, for 'defending the interest and prestige of the FIE during the war'. A servant stole his gold medal for the team epee, but the individual gold, his other Olympic medals and all his certificates are intact. Later on, Anspach became an Olympic referee, and at the age of 90 attended the 1972 Munich Olympics. He died, five months short of his 100th birthday, in 1981.

"He rarely spoke about what happened between himself and Heydrich", said Pierre Raes, curator of Brussels' fencing museum. "I think because he found it tragic that someone in the higher echelons of the fencing world was so dishonourable."

"It's very difficult to outlive him by so many years", says Edith Anspach, who inherited the house in Rue de la Victoire. "But he was an extraordinary man, and I have some magnificent memories."

Paul Anspach was an extraordinary man: in the most surreal but frightening contest of his life, he held his head high – and did his sport proud.

Energetics of Epee Fencing

Fencing is a high intensity intermittent sport and therefore requires the ability to produce energy for explosive movements, such as lunging, as well as to recover quickly in order to repeat these movements during a fight and throughout a competition. This can make fitness training for fencing quite interesting.

In an epee poule fight, which can last up to 3 minutes of fencing time, there can be a number of breaks, for

instance when a point is scored, allowing the fencer time to rest. Knowing the amount of activity within the 3 minutes as well as the average rest times could help with specific training protocols for fencers. Achieving greater understanding of the movement analysis of direct elimination fights could also help with specific training protocols. With this in mind, we undertook a research study examining the movement analysis of a simulated epee competition.



Eight male epeeists took part in a simulated competition consisting of six fights to five hits to represent the first round of a competition, then after a break a further eight direct elimination fights were undertaken to simulate reaching the final from the last 128 of a competition. Throughout all of these fights, heart rates were monitored as well as perception of fatigue of legs, sword arm and overall body fatigue. Video analysis of all the fights allowed the work-to-rest ratio, as well as the number of simple attacks and the number of retreats by the fencers, to be established.

The study results demonstrated that the average length of a poule fight was 2 minutes with a work-to-rest ratio of 9:8sec. Within this time frame fencers extended their arms on two or three occasions for every point and performed at least one lunge. Once in every two points they retreated along the piste. During the direct elimination fights, the average duration of a fight was 5min 30sec with a work-to-rest ratio of 11:10sec. The intensity at which fencing was undertaken was on average 75-95% of the fencers' maximal heart rate.

So what information can we take away from this data for general conditioning training for epee fencing? Specific training to increase explosive power must be undertaken to improve lunging performance. This can be done through the use of a strength and conditioning programme, at first with no resistance and gradually increasing in a stepwise manner with the use of external resistance such as weights.

More importantly, to improve performance in poule fights, training should be targeted between 2 and 3 minutes with a work-to-rest ratio of 9:8sec. Training exercises should be done at an intensity of 75-95% maximal heart rate with maximal heart rate being reached on occasions. This type of exercise will cause a burning sensation in the legs due to a build up of lactic acid. However, the more you practice, the more efficient your body will get at metabolising and removing the lactic acid. Don't forget, you do not just perform one poule fight, so consider structuring your training as though you are completing the first round of a competition.

For direct elimination fight training, adjusting your work to rest ratio to 11:10sec and increasing the total duration to 5-6 minutes may be more likely to impact performance in the longer term. Training drills commonly tend to focus on fencing specific footwork but for variety sprinting or skipping would also develop the correct fitness for fencing. To help improve your fencing training and competition performances, think about structuring your training around these intensities and durations. Often at fencing training, fights are rushed and points are a lot quicker than in competition so take your time and provide scenarios where you can only score hits after a certain time period.

Give it to your husband to wear at his next competition. His reluctance to talk to other fencers about his Finalist competition will be interpreted as modesty. He will be rated and his confidence restored. This method has worked well for several of my trainees.

Coach Egor replies: Omit the words 'mass appeal'.


Harry Simmons writes from the County Fencing Academy (formerly the County Fencing Club):

World Championships

There were over 650 fencers from 45 countries at the 2012 world championships in Krems, Austria, and Great Britain found medals much harder to come by than usual in recent years. The solitary gold medal went to Clare Halsted who beat Judith Offerle (USA) 9-3 in the final of the Over-60 women's foil. Halsted was ranked fifth after the poules but sailed through the DE, comfortably dispatching opponents from Germany, France and Japan. In the final she established an early lead and took control of the fight, rarely allowing Offerle a chance of a hit.

Elsewhere, Janet Cooksey proved as reliable as ever in picking up medals, winning silver in both the Over-70 epee and foil. On both occasions she came up against the classy Frenchwoman Marie Chantal Demaille, who was impressive in the way she took both finals away from Cooksey with what seemed like relative ease. Graham Paul also won a silver medal, battling from a modest 12th seed in the Over-60 men's foil to face Kenichi Hinoshita from Japan in the final. But the compact and mobile Hinoshita proved too much for Paul, winning 10-6.


Neal Mallett collected a bronze medal after a heroic near-miss performance in the Over-50 men's epee. Ranked 40 out of 82 after the poules, he fought his way to the last eight where he came up against the reigning champion, Volodymyr Sokolov of the Ukraine. This was an epic contest and, as word went round the hall that Sokolov was in trouble, a huge crowd gathered around the piste to see the unfancied Brit turf the champion out of the tournament 10-7. A disconsolate Sokolov sat at the end of the piste for nearly half an hour after the match finished seemingly unable to comprehend what had happened to him. His fellow Ukrainian, and eventual winner, Roman Semykoz, blocked Mallett's route to the final winning a cagey low-scoring semi-final bout on priority.




Other bronze medals went to Bill Osbaldeston in the Over-70 men's sabre, Sylvia Brown in the Over-70 women's sabre and Fiona Haldane in the Over-60 women's epee. Haldane's event drew a large crowd to one of the semi-finals when controversial American transgender fencer Elizabeth Kocab fought the Italian Iris Gardini. Kocab divides opinion and it was clear which side of the debate almost everybody at Krems was on as they cheered the Italian to a 10-7 victory. Gardini went on to beat the Finn Marja-Liisa Someroja 10-8 in a top quality final.

Fencing Paintings Sell Out





WEBB SECOND IN MEYLAN

Jonathan 'JJ' Webb, 16, of Camden Fencing Club took the silver medal in Meylan, France, on the European Cadet Circuit, coming through a field of 121 fencers.

Seeded second after the poules, Webb struggled through the L64, just beating Mathius Bellini (ITA) 15-14. But this was the wake-up call he needed and, after another close 15-13 win in the L32 over Thibault De Zuttere (FRA), he made light work of Thibaut Chauchoy (FRA) in the L16, beating him 15-8.

Next up was Alban Berges (FRA), who had previously knocked out Robin Amsalem. Webb was able to learn from this loss with his coach Ian Williams and eased into the semi-finals 15-7. Against Dario Cavaliere (ITA) Webb showed great energy in running away with the fight in the second period to win 15-12. In the final he faced Nael Canali (FRA) and put up a strong fight but had to settle for the silver medal as Canali won 15-10.

DEARY SIXTH IN GODOLLO

Will Deary, 15, of Truro Fencing Club made the final tableau at the 178-strong Godollo tournament in Hungary, on the European Cadet Circuit.

He won all six of his first round bouts and dropped only one in the second round to earn himself a bye to the L64 where he beat the Hungarian No. 1, Balint Kossuth, 15-13. In the L32 he edged out Bogdan Platonov (UKR) 15-14, finishing the fight with two well-timed parry ripostes. Platonov moved into the repechage.

Deary finished the L16 against Nick Herbon (GER) more comfortably 15-10 and then took out Ilya Nokhrin (RUS) 15-13 to reach the quarter-finals. There he faced Platonov again, but this time the Ukrainian got the better of him, winning 15-9. Platonov went on to win the tournament, beating Jonah Shainberg (USA) in the final with Viktor Habony (HUN) and Edward Chin (USA) taking the bronze medals.



Danielle Lawson of Malvern, Stourport and RGS Worcester has won the Hereford and Worcester Young Sports Woman of the Year award. Winner of the 2012 Manchester Cadet women's epee tournament, Danielle is currently top of the England under-15 girls' epee rankings, 2nd in the GB under-17 rankings and is the West Midlands senior champion.


