COLLEGE FENCING BOUTS

Intercollegiate Championship Tournament at New York A. C.

CORNELL'S TEAM IN THE LEAD

One Hundred and Eighty-two Contests Required to Decide the Winners---

Last Night's Results.

Equipped with foil, mask, and buskin, the fencers of the college teams began their annual tournament for the intercollegiate championship last night in the gymnasium of the New York Athletic Club. The teams represented the United States Naval Academy of Annapolis, the winners of the title last year; West Point, Yale, Harvard, Columbia, Cornell, and the University of Pennsylvania. The entire schedule includes 182 bouts, which is more than has ever been necessary in any former tournament.

At the end of the eightieth bout last night Cornell's team was in the lead. This was because of the expertness of W. L. Blount, who handled his foil with the greatest skill and was very adroit at putting the button tip against the breast of his opponents. Blount made a record of seven straight victories before meeting his first defeat. At the close of the evening's work another Cornell man, W. L. Bowman, had made the same record of seven victories and one defeat. There was one Columbia representative, F. B. Clark, who finished with eight victories and one defeat.

Among the young cadets of the Naval Academy there was a lot of splendid material. However, they did not appear to be as strong as the team of last year. S. D. Breckinridge acquitted himself well, and the men expect to pull up to the top place before the final bouts to-night. For the West Pointers, the swordsmanship of G. J. Rowcliff greatly assisted in holding the team up to second position. The Columbia, Yale, and Harvard fencers were unequal to the task imposed upon them by the cadets, and because of this fell behind in the race. Beginning at 2:30 this afternoon, the bouts will be resumed, and continue into the evening until finished. There is intense rivalry between the navy and army, the latter being bent upon capturing the trophy presented as emblematic of the cham-pionship and the individual medals offered by Col. W. M.
