

NAVAL FENCERS WIN TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

Loge of Columbia Gets Intercollegiate Individual Honors.

ARMY LOSES BY TWO BOUTS

Close Finish Marks the Closing Tournament Contests in New York Athletic Club Gymnasium.

The Army, the Navy, and the Columbia University fencers furnished the real sport last night at the New York Athletic Club in the final bouts for the intercollegiate fencing championships. When the closing eighteen bouts of the long-drawn-out contest were started in the gymnasium at 9 o'clock, the naval cadets were well in the lead with 38 victories to their credit, while the Army and Columbia were fighting manfully for second place with 33 and 30 victories each. These positions were unchanged during the evening, although the West Point cadets made so splendid a tussle to retain their championship honors as to lend an element of uncertainty until the last bout was over.

For the past two years the army has held the fencing championship, but the Naval Cadets were a shade the better this year and won the team championship with a total of 39 victories to 15 defeats. The Army only lost by two bouts, winning 37 and losing 17, while Columbia was third, with 33 wins and 21 defeats.

Frederick Loge, the best Columbia fencer, won the individual championship. Of his 18 bouts, he only lost 1, and that one was his last contest against H. Heckheimer of Cornell.

The Columbia delegation was naturally delighted at winning the individual championship. Frederick Loge began his evening bouts with a clean score of victories. The only two men that he had to face were Fleischer of the University of Pennsylvania, and Heckheimer of Cornell. The fourth bout of the evening was between Loge and Fleischer. Applause greeted the rivals as they stepped to the platform. The Pennsylvanian, however, was no match for the Columbia expert. Loge attacked fiercely from the start, forcing his opponent on the defensive at once, and by his aggressiveness breaking through Fleischer's guard continually. Heckheimer surprised the crowd by the masterful way in which he disposed of Loge, but in a previous bout against Barber of West Point the judges had to call for two extra bouts before giving Barber the victory.
