

COLUMBIA FENCER WINS WITH FOILS

Louis Mouquin Takes Individual Honors in the Intercol- legiate Tourney.

Louis Mouquin, Captain of the Columbia University fencing team, who contests with his left hand, last night came through to a victory in the intercollegiate foils championship tournament, contested in the grand ball room of the Hotel Astor, with probably the best score ever recorded by any fencer in this competition. The big Columbia youth, who weighs more than 200 pounds, registered fourteen victories and had only one defeat in the three sessions of fencing, which started on Friday night at the Hotel Astor. Mouquin, who was runner-up in last year's tournament, won every exhibition with the skill of a master, and in the only bout in which he met defeat he compelled his opponent to go three extra periods to win. William H. Russell of Harvard alone succeeded in mastering the Columbia Captain, defeating him in one of the afternoon contests by a score of 18 to 17.

The United States Naval Academy team once more brought the team championship emblem back to Annapolis, scoring over Yale, Columbia, Harvard, Cornell, and Pennsylvania in such convincing style that the title was clinched before the final round was started in the evening. The midshipmen won 36 bouts and lost 9, while Yale, which figured more prominently than in the last five years, took second place with 28 victories and 17 defeats. Through the great efforts of Mouquin, Columbia finished third with 23 bouts won and 22 lost.

The individual sabres championship went to C. De V. Headlee, a Naval Academy youngster, who went through seven bouts without meeting his peer. Headlee fenced with dash and vigor that could not be denied, and not one of his six opponents could compel him to travel at his top speed.

R. P. Pfeiffer of Yale, who was a prominent contender for the individual honors in the early stages of the tournament, received a deep slash on the left side while he was putting W. H. Russell of Harvard out of the running for the championship. During the second extra period of fencing between these men, Russell's foil broke as it struck Pfeiffer on the back, penetrating the left side and tearing through the flesh almost half an inch. The Yale fencer was attended by Dr. S. S. Burt, and after receiving treatment resumed the match and won.

L. Doughty of the Naval Academy gave Mouquin a hard fight for the individual title, but he lost one more bout than the Columbia Captain and won one less. Doughty was defeated by Mouquin in a scientific exhibition by a 5 to 4 score, and also fell before F. D. Downey of Yale.

The Navy team won in competition against all of its five rivals. Harvard lost by 9 bouts, Cornell 6 to 3, Pennsylvania 8 to 1, Yale 7 to 2, and Columbia 6 to 3.

A feature of the tournament was the meeting of S. W. Allison of Columbia and M. G. Allison of Cornell in the final bout of the night, which was directed by P. W. Allison of the New York A. C. as chief judge. All three are brothers and each is an excellent wielder of the foil. The Columbia Allison won, but only after an extra period match, by a score of 12 to 11.

H. J. White of the Naval Academy, who finished fourth with 11 victories and 4 defeats, tried hard to put Mouquin out of the running, but was unsuccessful after three periods, the local man winning, 15 to 14. The summary:

NEWS FOR BILLIARDISTS.

A new type of balkline billiards has been invented by Tom Foley, one of the well-known Western roomkeepers. In the game which he proposes, and which has already found some supporters, one chalk line is drawn from end to end of the table, midway between the side rails. This provides two playing spaces in which one free shot may be taken. On the subsequent shot one of the object balls must cross the line. Those who have played the game find that it affords much interest and that there is keen enjoyment for the spectator as well. In the original plan no anchor space was provided, but with this substitution the game calls for a high test of skill. The game provides more open play than regulation balkline, for there is little opportunity afforded for close nurse execution along the lines which mark the high-class professional matches. Also there is no free space in the centre of the table. The balls have to be played in and out all the time so that only the expert can attain proficiency at the innovation game.

W. Emmett Blankenship, who recently won the professional pocket billiard championship in Chicago, will defend his title for the first time on May 4, 5, and 6 in Detroit. John Layton of Sedalia, Mo., is the challenger, and Blankenship has named the above dates for the match.

The Amateur Billiard League, which has drawn to its support a number of the clubs in the metropolitan district, will hold a meeting Wednesday night at the Amateur Billiard Club, at which time a constitution and bylaws will be submitted for the approval of the delegates.

Several changes in the professional pocket billiard rules are now under consideration. The proposals have mainly to do with the calling of fouls and scratches. It is suggested that the full responsibility for calling fouls be placed upon the referee. At present the opposing player calls the fouls and sometimes considers it to his advantage not to exact the penalty of the foul. Under the new plan the decision is to be made by the referee, and all fouls will be considered as scratches.

Word received from Chicago indicates that George Sutton is now playing better billiards than ever before in his career. In a recent exhibition he ran 622 at 18.2 balkline, which is one of the best performances ever credited to a billiardist. Willie Hoppe made a run of 622 when he was in Paris, and Firmin Cassagnol ran 598 in a practice game some time ago in Paris. Sutton is prepared to challenge any one. He has already issued a challenge to Willie Hoppe and posted his forfeit money, \$250. If he can obtain a match with Hoppe, Sutton is willing to play for \$2,500 a side. Sutton's challenge takes precedence over that of Firmin Cassagnol. If Sutton cannot secure a match he will compete in the 18.2 tournament which will be held in the Fall.

Willie Hoppe, who has been touring the West with Yamada, is on his way to Honolulu. After playing there for several days, he will proceed with Yamada to Japan, and he will probably not return to this country until late in the Fall.

J. Ferdinand Poggenburg, holder of the Metropolitan Challenge Cup, will play the challenger, Francis S. Appleby, at the Liederkrantz Club on Friday night. The game will be 300 points at 18.2 balkline.

Smart Set Games on Friday.

The indoor athletic season will close next Friday evening with the third set of games of the Smart Set Athletic Club of Brooklyn, which will be contested in the Thirteenth Regiment Armory. This meet will mark the last local appearance for some time of Howard P. Drew of Los Angeles, Roy Morse, national 220-yard champion; Brooke Brewer of Washington, Sol Eutler of Dubuque College, Iowa, and Binga Dismond of the University of Chicago. The feature of the games will be the third running of the J. B. Taylor Memorial Quarter, in which the field will include Homer Baker, Binga Dismond, Irving T. Howe of Boston, and Dave Caldwell of the Boston A. A. Drew, Howe, Brewer, Morse, and others will meet in the 90-yard special dash.
