The midshipmen, presenting an excellent team, considering that it was made up chiefly of newcomers in the field. showed the most clean-cut prowess and gained the championship title for, the second successive year with a total of 27 victories and 9 defeats. Harvard fencers finished second, with 26 bouts won, 10 lost, and Columbia took third place with 18 victories and the same number of defeats. Jeter, of the Navy, a vet-eran of last year's championship team, did the best work for the midshipmen and landed the individual championship with a slate of eleven victories and one defeat for the entire competition, a wonderful performance. Jeter, however, did not land his individual honors until after a rather hard struggle with S. W. Allison, the Columbia star, who remained on even terms with the midshipman up to within a few bouts of the closing of the competition. A defeat suffered by Allison at the hands of R. D. De Kay of the Navy, however, put Jeter in the lead, to remain there to the finish of the tournament. R. T. Gallemore, Annapolis, finished second with ten victories and two defeats, and Allison tied for third indi-vidual honors with W. H. Russell and E. R. Gay, both of Harvard, with rec-
