WILL FENCE AT OLYMPICS.

Leicester, New College Champion, to Go Regardless of Tryouts.

John F. Leicester, Jr., of Yale, winner of the individual intercollegiate foils championship in the tournament which ended at the Hotel Astor Saturday night, will be included on America's Olympic Games fencing team as a result of action taken yesterday at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Intercollegiate Fencing Association.
The young Eli fencer will be sent

abroad for the Olympic events, Aug. 15 to 28, at the expense of the I. F. A., regardless of the result of the Olympic tryouts. Funds to defray the expenses of Leicester will be available from the receipts of the recent titular tournament, in which the Yale fencer com-peted in fifteen bouts without experi-

encing defeat.
The Executive Committee appointed an Advisory Committee which will have charge of arrangements for future cham-pionship tournaments. The increasing interest in the sport among the colleges, with the resultant larger entries. led to this action. The committee will be com-

posed of Dr. J. B. Clemens, Sherman Hall and Dr. B. F. O'Connor.
S. H. Ordway of Harvard was elected President for the ensuing year: H. H. Myers, Naval Academy, Vice President, and A. P. Walker, Yale, Secretary-Treasurer. These officers will comprise the Executive Committee.
