John Mark Pesek of the United States Military Academy won the intercollegiate épée championship when he defeated C. H. Callaway of the United States Naval Academy, winner of the title last year, in the fence-off between the two after they had tied in the final round in this competition.

West Point also took the team honors West Point also took the team honors with a total of nine bouts won and five lost, Annapolis won eight and lost six. Pennsylvania won four and lost six. Pennsylvania won four and lost ten, and Harvard won three and lost eleven.

Army won the team sabre championship, capturing eleven bouts. Lawrence V. Castner, captain of the cadet team, captured individual honors. He won nine straight bouts and was the only man who went through the entire day's competition without losing a bout.

Army, by taking first in the sabres and épee events and fourth in the foils. and épee events and fourth in the folls, won the new three weapon trophy offered this year by the Intercollegiate Fencing Association for all-around effi-Reinhold F. Hertzberg of Dartmouth took second honors to Castner with the sabre, winning six bouts and losing one. He was the only fencer to qualify for the finals in both sabres and foils.

Pesek's victory in the fence-off was a reversal of the decision of the match between the two in the regular round-robin, which Callaway won. Three minutes were required to decide the tie between them. Callaway, who is much taller than Pesek, rushed in to make his thrust. His point reached its mark, but Pesek counted also, and the judges decided that the latter's touch was made first.

There were nine contenders for the individual title, and four pairs competing for team honors. Harold Boulton of Yale was the extra man. He won five bouts and lost three. E. H. Price of the Military Academy won four and lost the same number and J. S. Keating of the Naval Academy won three and lost five, C. J. Shearn Jr., Harvard, Donald Thomson and D. F. Cav-

ers of Pennsylvania each won two and lost six, and J. K. Watson, Harvard, won one out of eight. Boulton's matches counted only in the individual competi-

Pesek and Callaway each won six out or eight matches. The success of the service fencers was not unexpected, as both are swordsmen of known ability and had shown the worth of their steel in the qualifying round. Boulton of Yale was a dangerous man through of eight matches.
