PHILADELPHIA, April 2.-Team entries for the Pennsylvania Relay Carnival on April 25 and 26 closed today with a total of exactly 500 colleges and schools on the list. is seventy-five more than last year and breaks all records. The college list totals 113 teams from Cambridge University, England; Edinburg University, Scotland; University of Havana. Cuba. and several Canadian institutions are entered. Texas will be represented by the University of Texas and Baylor University, California by Occidental College, Oregon by the Oregon Aggles and Florida by the University of Florida. Owing to the large number of high schools entered in the relays the management has added several races to the program.
