COLLEGE FENCING

Shows Way With 42 Points—
Navy Sets Pace With Epee,
C. C. N. Y. With Foil

New York University's squad led a strong field for three-weapon honors as the first half of the fifty-second Intercollegiate Fencing Association championships was completed in the City College gymnasium last night.

Exhibiting scoring power with all weapons, the Violet led by four points, with a total of 42, at the end of the opening session. In second place was C. C. N. Y., the defending three-weapon champion.

Yesterday's program indicated that N. Y. U., coached by Hugo Castello, was out to make a strong bid for top laurels, but it became apparent that the Violet faced a tough battle. Not only did the Beavers show that they were definite contenders, but Navy, Princeton, Rutgers and Army also turned in some fine work.

Honors Are Divided

As far as individual weapons went, three different schools held the lead at the end of the opening skirmishes. Navy, out to regain the three-weapon crown it lost last year, led in the epee class with a total of 13 points.

But navy was unable to do as well with the second weapon, the foil. CCNY took down these honors with an aggregate of 17 markers. The showing by the Beavers with the light blade was unusually strong, only one marker being dropped.

Frank Billadello and Francis Kramer each accounted for six decisions for the Lavender while Oscar Price was credited with 5 and 1.

Set Pace With Saber

Despite the sterling performance made by C. C. N. Y. with the foil, at the end of this phase N. Y. U. led the Lavender by two points. The University Heighters, while not able to lead with either of the first two weapons, displayed consistent scoring power.

The Violets then added to their advantage by pacing the field with the saber for a total of 14 points. City College, Navy and Army, near the top since the start of the tournament early in the afternoon, tied for second with the saber with an even dozen markers each.

Thus did this colorful event get into full swing. With the largest field in the history of the association, the tourney promises an interesting climax.

Thirteen colleges, with an entry of 117 individuals, made up the starting field.
