N. Y. U. BEATS NAVY FOR FENCING TITLE

Violets Top Middies in Last Saber Match That Decides College 3-Weapon Crown

After one of the most unusual competitions in the fifty-three year history of the intercollegiate fencing championship, New York University won three-weapon team supremacy by taking two of three final saber bouts from Navy as the tourney closed yesterday at N. Y. U.'s School of Education gym. The Violet tallied 73½ points and the midshipmen 72½.


There was an almost incredible tie between N. Y. U. and Navy after 105 bouts for each. All even at the conclusion of the épée team test Friday, they finished the same

An Unprecedented Finish

While onlookers and competitors alike waited for a "break," both teams went right on down to the wire in the saber round-robin, totaling the same number of points with this weapon until they opposed each other in the final match to decide the three-weapon championship. Nothing like this had happened in fencing annals previously.

A good share of the ultimate honors fell upon N. Y. U.'s saber veterans, Dan Rubinstein and Sam Rubinstein. Dan, the No. 1 man, beat Samuel Powel 3d of Navy, 5-1, and then his brother Sam triumphed by the same score over Edward Wood. The N. Y. U. enthusiasts swarmed in quickly to congratulate the Rubinsteins, for those two points clinched threeweapon honors. In the last of the three bouts Navy's man, Norbert Walecka, beat sophomore Martin Schneider, 5-4. N. Y. U. captured two of three

possible points from Navy for a final score in the saber of 21 to 20 for the midshipmen. N. Y. U. and Navy had tallied 25½ each in Friday's épée bouts and 27 each during the matinee session yesterday with the foil. Army Best With Saber
