
Intercollegiate Fencing Association Holds 57th Annual Championships

COLUMBIA TAKES EPEE TEAM TITLE

Lions Score With 24 Points, With Navy at 23, as 57th Fencing Tourney Starts

By the margin of a single point, Columbia won the épée team title as the fifty-seventh Intercollegiate Fencing Association championship began at New York University's Alumni Gymnasium at University Heights yesterday.

The Blue and White accounted for 24 points, each representing an individual victory in the round - robin that decided the honors among the twelve competing colleges. Navy, the threeweapon champion, compiled 23 points for second place.

Cornell finished in a three-way tie for third with Yale and N. Y. U. at 19, while the defender, Pennsylvania, was deadlocked with Princeton and Rutgers at 18. Then followed Harvard with 14, Army 10, Brooklyn College 9 and City College 7.

Although Columbia had won eight foil championships and nine with the saber, the Lions' trio of Irwin Bernstein, Frank Wald and Luke Moreau had the distinction of bringing the épée laurels to Columbia for the first time. The épée competition has been part of the tourney only since 1923.

Bernstein Clinches Title

Chief interest centered in the team race. The midshipmen captured two of their last three bouts against N. Y. U. Meanwhile on an adjoining strip Columbia clinched the decision as Bernstein won from Lester Scherer of Harvard. Columbia dropped its next two bouts to Harvard, but that was academic.

Six qualified for the individual épée championships, to be decided tomorrow night, but the defender, Herman Wallner of N. Y. U., was not among them. It was Wallner who beat Tom Sisson of Navy as the midshipmen were making their bid in the last round. The loss of that point was costly to Navy.

Wallner lost four of his eleven bouts in his pool, in which George Jacoby Jr. of Yale had the best record, winning ten and losing one. The winner of the title for the last two years, Wallner failed in a fence-off for one of the three qualifying places.

Richard Pew, Cornell's No. 1 épée fencer, qualified with a 9-2 performance, as did Harry Schaft of N. Y. U. Wallner was tied with Bernstein of Columbia and Walter Brackelmann of Rutgers at 7—4. Bracklemann qualified in the fence-off by beating Wallner, 3—1, and Bernstein, 3—2. Don Loring, Navy captain, and

Moreau also qualified for the individual championship. Loring had a record of 9—2 in his pool. Moreau, a sophomore, accounted for one of the surprises as he swept off with the first seven bouts in his pool and finished with a 9-2 performance.

Tourney Continues Today

The championship continues today with the foil, sabre and the three-weapon team titles at stake as well as individual titles.

Schaft is 6-foot 5 inches tall, the same height as his friend Wallner, who was responsible for the fact that Schaft became a fencer. There was irony in Schaft's qualification and Wallner's failure.

Penn's 3-0 shutout of Navy was a blow to the midshipmen.
