


Fencing Contests Become a Father-and-Son Affair

Navy Takes College Epee Title

And Leads for 3-Weapon Crown

Middies Have 4-Point Edge The Summaries Over N.Y.U., Which Wins

in Foil 3d Year in Row New York University took

the Little Iron Man Trophy for the third straight year last night in the sixty-second annual Intercollegiate Fencing Association championships with an outstanding team performance in the foils competition. Navy, however, managed to hold on to a slim 4-point lead in

the struggle for the threeweapon title. The midshipmen, winners of the épée crown earlier in the day with 26 points, added 21 more in the foils division for a total of 47. N. Y. U., which scored a disappointing 15 points in the épée,

team of Gene Glazer, Martin Davis and Herman Goldstein, recorded twenty-eight victories in thirty bouts for an over-all total of 43 points. Two Are Undefeated Glazer, a sophomore, and

Davis, a senior who has been on all three winning teams in this event, went through their schedule of ten bouts undefeated. Goldstein, another sophomore,

was brilliant in foils. The Violet

suffered the only two defeats but qualified for the individual foils today in Pool 3 with an 8-2 record. Glazer and Davis, of course, qualified easily in Pools 1 and 2, respectively. It marked N. Y. U.'s best won-and-lost record in the three!

years it has taken the Little Iron Man prize, the oldest trophy in intercollegiate competition. In third place, behind Navy and the Violets, were Princeton and Columbia, both with 37

points. The Tigers tallied 18 in finishing third in the épée and 19 in the same spot in the foils. The Lions had 21 in épée and 16 in foils. The two-day tournament at the Concourse Plaza Hotel in the Bronx will end today with the saber team competition in

They also had two undefeated fencers in Roland Wommack and Larry Riley. Their third man, Hubert Strachwitz suffered the four defeats and failed to qualify for

the individual round. His six victories contributed handsomely, however, to Navy's winning total. Andre Deladrier, the Navy coach, said the épée trio "exceeded all my expectations."

Deladrier, son of Navy's head coach from 1927 to 1948, Clovis Deladrier, took over the head coaching reins last year from Joe Fiens. The latter guided Navy to successive three-weapon titles in 1956 and 1957. Wommack, who makes his home in Philadelphia, registered

his ten straight victories in Pool 1 and qualified easily for today's individual competition. Riley's undefeated skein was a pleasant surprise to Coach

Deladrier. The Evansville, Ind., youth fenced in Pool 3 and also qualified for the individual bouts. Strachwitz, from Reno, Nev., finished fourth in Pool 2 and failed to qualify. His six vic-

tories, however, contributed

handsomely to Navy's winning cause. For the first time in the history of the intercollegiate tournament, the foils competition—team and individual—is being fenced by electrical 11 touches.

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
