

# N. Y. U. TEAM GAINS 3-WEAPON HONORS

**Takes 26 of 30 Saber Bouts  
and Beats Navy, 69-65—**

**Columbia Fencers Third**

New York University had too much power for Navy in the saber team event yesterday in the sixty-second annual intercollegiate fencing championships and the Violets captured the three-weapon title for the first time since 1952.

The Violet saber trio of Michael Dasaro, Steve Greene and Michael Jochowitz won twenty-six of thirty bouts. This effort enabled N. Y. U. to take the three-weapon crown by a 69-65 margin over Navy.

The midshipmen, who led, 47—43, at the end of the first day's competition Friday evening at the Concourse Plaza Hotel, could only muster 18 points in the heavy weapon event yesterday.

## **Navy's Lead Overcome**

N. Y. U.'s foils and saber threesomes had to fence brilliantly to overcome the impressive total of 26 points piled up by Navy in winning the epee Friday, the first team event. The Violets' epee team turned in a disappointing performance in scoring only 15 tallies.

The N. Y. U. rush to the three-weapon crown started late Friday evening when the foils team of Gene Glazer, Martin Davis and Herman Goldstein reeled off twenty-eight victories in thirty engagements. Glazer and Davis went undefeated in ten jousts. Navy picked up 21 points here.

This set the stage for yesterday's saber event. It was expected that the strong N. Y. U. saber group, headed by Dasaro, an Olympic team member, would win the event. The question was how many points could they score and could Navy offset this by scoring well itself?

The answer was forthcoming after the eighth of the eleven-round competition had been completed. In this round, N. Y. U. blanked Navy, 3—0, and virtually put a stranglehold on the three-weapon title. The Violets clinched it two rounds later. To add frosting to the cake, the winners went undefeated in the squad versus squad competition.

## **Jochowitz Carries Load**

Surprisingly, Dasaro was not the big swordsman for N. Y. U. This honor fell to the No. 3 man, Jochowitz. The senior from Queens, who has only been fencing a year and a half, swept through his ten bouts without a setback. Dasaro, in the more rugged Pool 1, ended with an 8-2 record and tied for second with Stewart Reuter of Columbia be-

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hind the leader, Alfonso Morales of Navy, whose record was 9—1.

Greene headed the fencers in Pool 2 with eight victories and two defeats. Thus all three Violet representatives moved into the individual saber finals later in the day along with Morales, Reuter and Harold Mayer of City College.

This put seven N. Y. U. men in the three individual competitions: Glazer, Davis and Goldstein in the foils and Christian Pascal in the epee.

There was considerable daylight between Navy and the third-place finisher, Columbia. The Lions, who edged N. Y. U. for the three-weapon title last year, finished with 55 points. Princeton was a close fourth with 54. Cornell and Yale ended in a tie for fifth with 47 each. Penn, C. C. N. Y., Harvard, Rutgers and Brooklyn College rounded out the field in that order.

The N. Y. U. victory capped an all-winning year for Coach Hugo Castello's charges. They went undefeated in ten dual meets.

### Navy Men Take Titles

In the individual contests, Navy received considerable solace when Morales won the saber title with a record of 5—0 and Roland Wommack posted the same mark for the crown in epee.

Morales upset Dasaro, the defending champion, in the saber. The N. Y. U. fencer finished with a 3-2 record. Harold Mayer, C. C. N. Y., also was 3—2. Greene and Jocknowitz, both N. Y. U., had identical marks of 2—3. Reuter, Columbia, was 0—5.

Wommack, Navy's national collegiate titleholder who swept through his epee team effort undefeated, tacked on another five triumphs in the individual event. Dave Micahnik, Penn., was second with 4—1. Steve Buchman, Columbia, was 3—2; Greg Bradshaw, Penn, and Pascal, N. Y. U., 1—3 each, and Larry Riley, Navy, 0—5.

Glazer, a sophomore of extraordinary promise, salvaged one individual title for N. Y. U. of the three contested. He won in a tense fence-off with Joseph Paletta, Navy, in the foils. Glazer won, 5—4, and finished with a 4-1 record.
