

N.Y.U. Fencers Keep Foils Title

Retain Little Iron Man Trophy—Epee Won by Princeton

New York University fencers proved superior with the foil again last night in the intercollegiate championships. The trio coached by Hugo Castello turned in a brilliant exhibition in retaining the title and winning the Little Iron Man Trophy for the fourth year in a row.

This oldest of intercollegiate trophies went to the Violets, who captured twenty-four of a possible twenty-seven bouts at the Concourse Plaza Hotel, the Bronx, yesterday.

As a consequence, N. Y. U. leads in the over-all race among the ten competing colleges for the three-weapon crown. Earlier, Princeton surprised by capturing the epee title, supplanting Navy as the champion. It was the first time the Tigers had carried off these laurels since 1940.

N. Y. U.'s point total, with one credit going for every bout won, is now 43, with the saber to be decided this morning, prior to the individual championships.

Tigers, Navy in Tie

Princeton and Navy trail with 37 each, while Yale has 29, Penn and Columbia are bracketed at 27, Cornell has 23, Harvard 18, City College 16 and Rutgers 13.

Gene Glazer, a 20-year-old junior from Forest Hills, Queens; Herb Cohen, a 19-year-old southpaw sophomore from Brooklyn, and Peter Stein, a 21-year-old emigre from Hamburg, Germany, comprised the Violets' championship foil squad.

Glazer won 7 and lost 2 in Pool One. Cohen was unbeaten and registered 9 points for his side.

Stein, who learned to fence in Germany, dropped only one of nine bouts. The N. Y. U. rooters were elated when all three of their foilsmen qualified for today's individual championship.

Princeton, with 16 points, was third in the foil competitions finishing astern of the midshipmen, who had 18.

In the epee, the Tigers received considerable help from Frank Anger, who had a perfect score. The 20-year-old junior from Glen Ellyn, Ill., was in Pool Three and clicked off nine victories.

Coach Born in Brooklyn

The pupils of Stanley Sieja, their Brooklyn-born coach, had a happy day. Anger's helpmates in bagging the trophy were Bob Chapman of Evansville, Ind., and Juris Raudseps of Columbus, Ohio. Raudseps, who was born in Latvia, turned in a 7-2 score while Chapman's tally was 5-4.

Later John Coe, a 21-year-old Princeton senior from Southboro, Mass., aided the Tigers by the best fencing in Pool One of the foil. He only lost one bout and qualified for the individual championship from his

strip along with Glazer and Raoul Sudre of Cornell.

Columbia had one qualifier in the foil when Richard Rothenberg survived a fence-off against Navy and Princeton.

Navy's Bill Lewis, who tied Stein of N. Y. U. in the regulation round-robin, bowed to the Violet's man, in the subsequent fence-off, 5-2.
