—Navy carried off most of the team trophies in the 67th championships of the Intercollegiate Fencing Association today.

Columbia, which came within one bout of making a sweep of all four team crowns a year ago and was undefeated in dual competition this season, was shorn of its titles in the Naval Academy field house.
