

Navy Fencers Win Three-Weapon Title

ANNAPOLIS, Md., March 14
—Navy carried off most of the team trophies in the 67th championships of the Intercollegiate Fencing Association today.

Columbia, which came within one bout of making a sweep of all four team crowns a year ago and was undefeated in dual competition this season, was shorn of its titles in the Naval Academy field house.

The winner of the team foil championship yesterday, Navy tied with City College of New York for the saber title today and won the three-weapon trophy. Andre Deladrier's midshipman swordsmen had placed third behind Rutgers with the

épée. They finished with a total of 76 points in the three competitions.

Rutgers, City College and New York University shared the top honors in the individual competitions.

Paul Pesthy, David Claridge and George Bolge, who won the first team title for Rutgers in the intercollegiate by taking the épée crown yesterday, gained first, third and fifth places in the individual finals today. Art Peterson of Cornell placed second and also received the Georges L. Cointe Award, given for outstanding sportsmanship in honor of the late Cornell fencing coach.

Raymond Fields and Robert Kao of City College took first and second places in the individual saber championship. Marvin Garovoy and Gerald Cetrullo of N.Y.U. finished in the same order with the foil. Rear Adm. Charles S. Minter Jr., the Superintendent of the Naval Academy, and Capt. William Busik, the director of athletics, were among those who presented the trophies to the winners in the ceremonies at the end of the tournament.

Columbia, with 67 points, was runner-up for the three weapon honors, which it won last year, along with the épée and foil titles.

Some of the most exciting moments of the tournament, in which 12 colleges participated, came in the last round of the saber team championship. Navy had beaten City College, 2—1, in the round-robin competition and led the New Yorkers by 23 points to 22 as the two teams took on their final opponents.

City College beat Princeton, 3—0, and then Coach Edward Lucia's swordsmen gathered around the strip on which Navy was still engaged with Cornell.

Cornell a Surprise Victor

Cornell, surprisingly, had won the bout in pool 2, to the delight of the City College men, and the latter stood by to cheer on Ronald Ruiz as he took on Dick Wilson of Navy, in the deciding bout between the No. 3 men.

The pressure on Wilson was tremendous. He had to win or Navy would yield the saber championship to City College. With adherents of the two teams leaping up and screaming in excitement at every touch, Wilson won the bout, 5 to 2, and so Navy shared in the title.
