N.Y.U. Clinches Epee Laurels, Shares Foil Title With Columbia

PRINCETON, N. J., March 15 -New York University, Columbia and Navy dominated the opening round of the Intercollegiate Fencing Association's 71st annual championships in Princeton's Dillon Gymnasium today.

The two-day event attracted 12 member colleges in épée, foil and saber competition and in the combined three-weapon sword play for the team title.

The University of Pennsylvania won the saber event a year ago and captured the team championship at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, but N.Y.U., long a national power, finished with a clean sweep of the individual titles.

This morning the Violets, coached by Hugo Castello, began their battle to sweep the honors again by taking the épée competition.

George Masin, a 20-year-old senior from Patchogue, L. I., who never had a sword in his hand until he enrolled at N.Y.U. in Washington Square, thwarted his opposition by winning all 11 of his bouts. The 6-foot-4inch Masin attacks from the left side. He is a natural southpaw.

Wolosin of N.Y.U. Excels

The Violets' No. 2 pool man, Van Wolosin, a senior from Centereach, L. I., took nine bouts and Jim Dixon, another Long Islander, won five, giving the Violets a single-point victory over Columbia and City College, which were tied at 24. Naval Academy's trio The trailed with 22. N.Y.U. clinched the Epée by winning two of the final three bouts against the Lions. Masin beat Burt Pearlman, an all-American last year for the Lions. Wolosin defeated Kevin Larry Rodman of Sullivan. Coach Louis Bankuti's squad prevented a clean sweep by the Violets when he beat Dixon. Columbia could have won the foil but had to settle for a 27-27 tie with N.Y.U. The Lions, who had lost earlier in the afternoon to the Violets. 2 to 1, fell apart against a weak Yale squad.
