

N.Y.U. Wins Title Again In Fencing

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 9—Hugo Castello, who succeeded his father as the New York University coach 27 years ago, finished the Intercollegiate Fencing Association phase of his career today just as his father had —by winning another championship.

Castello's defending Violets recorded 79 points to top Columbia's 75. Princeton was third in the field of 13 with 61 points. The Violets next venture to Cleveland, March 28 through 30, in defense of the National Collegiate crown. After that, the 60-year-old Castello is retiring to concentrate on the domestic manufacture of karate and judo apparel.

Individual saber, the final weapon in the team competition, came down to a fence-off between Peter Westbrook of N.Y.U., the defender, and Columbia's Tom Losonczy. Westbrook won. The two have been saber rivals since junior high school in New Jersey.

In other weapons, Albert Peters, a third-pool entrant for N.Y.U. in epee, rose from his unseeded position to edge a teammate and the defending titleholder, Risto Herme. In foil, Johan Akerman, a former Swedish National Junior champion, led Massachusetts Institute of Technology to the team and individual title. For the Engineers, it was their first weapon title in 43 years of this 77-year-old competition.
