



Fencing news

OLYMPIC FENCER CHAIRS IOC COMMISSION

As chair of the International Olympic Committee's Athletes' Commission, Claudia Bokel of Germany, Olympic epee silver medallist in 2004, led an Athlete Career Programme delegation in November to six National Olympic Committees in southern Africa to hold workshops with local athletes and help them move into their post-competition careers. Since the programme was established in 2005, it has provided career development and job placement services to more than 10,000 Olympic athletes from over 100 countries.

AGM – OPEN FORUM

In response to a question from Ronald Velden about whether there had been any improvement in Britain's performance since the appointment of the performance director, chief executive Peter King said the World Class Performance Programme was not designed to get more fencers to achieve a L64 or better; it was focused on success in seven years' time.

DROP IN FENCING PARTICIPATION

The latest Active People survey from Sport England of once-a week participation in funded sports by those aged 16+ shows a decline in the number of people fencing from 13,600 in 2005/6 to 10,400 last year. Over the past seven years, only five out of 30 sports have shown any increase in regular participation.

AGM – FINANCES

The clearest explanation ever given of British Fencing's financial situation was the verdict on John Troiano's presentation of the accounts at the AGM. He began by going through the bad news: a heavy deficit of £216,000 was recorded for the financial year 2012-13, made up as follows:

- £99k on BF events, of which £47k was on the FIE women's sabre England Cup now cancelled, £33k on championships at senior, junior and cadet level and£8k on the Eden Cup/Leon Paul.
- £25k excess spend over budget on legal fees, the bulk of which being appeals over Olympic selection.
- £24k of bad debts written off a one-off occurrence.
- £21k on the Olympic Games.
- £19k on miscellaneous expenses.
- £14k excess spend on The Sword.
- £14k on other write downs final settlement of £6k relating to the 2009 junior world championships in Belfast; £8k reduced stock value.

As in the previous tax year, income had been just over £2 million, almost half of which was in the form of grants from UK Sport, with £172k coming from membership fees and £70k from sponsorship. Reserves were down to £292,648.

The better news was that the Board now saw the management accounts each month and had to approve any new expenditure, and new auditors, haysmacintyre, had been appointed to ensure that financial statements were accurate and clear. The Board's goal is to return the budget to balance over the next two years.

AGM – GROWTH IN THE NORTH-EAST

Beth Davidson outlined the progress made in the North-East following a £250,000 grant from Sport England in 2008, when she was appointed Fencing Development Officer. The aim was to increase participation in four years to 1000, but in that time more than 5000 people have had a go at fencing in the region. Another target was to increase the number of leader coaches to 50 in the three years to 2012; in fact, 220 have become Go Fence leaders, among them 69 unemployed young people who have in turn introduced more than 800 people from their communities to fencing. Although the fencing project finished in 2013, Sport England has introduced a new 3-year multi-sports programme. Quick to seize an opportunity, Beth has had wheelchair fencing accepted as a different sport.

NAVY FENCING WINS TOP AWARD

The Royal Navy men's fencing team has been awarded Best Team at the RN's annual sports awards, beating off stiff competition from rugby union, judo and cycling. It is the first time the team has won the Royal Navy's top sporting accolade, and comes on the back of a successful season crowned by victory over the Army and RAF at the 2013 Interservices Fencing Competition.

First competed in 1939, the Interservices pits swordsmen from all three services against each other in a day of intense but friendly competition. The Royal Navy were regular winners until 1957, when bayonet fencing was dropped from the competition. Since then the sport has been dominated by the other services, with a 20-year winning streak by the Army before the RAF rose to dominance in the 1980s. The Royal Navy did not win the title again until 2004 and since then have been snapping at the heels of the RAF fencers – narrowly losing the 2012 Interservices by one point.

"In the early days, the fact that we had Royal Marines fencing bayonet led to numerous victories for the RN," said Commander Mark Barton, Chairman of Navy Fencing. "It's taken us a while to get over losing that weapon, but we're back on form now and are looking to retain the title for as long as we can."

NORTH EAST REGION ACHIEVE THREE MORE YEARS OF FUNDING

Fencing North East has been granted £100,000 by Sport England through the Community Sport Activation Fund to continue its award winning work for a further three years. The funding will allow North East Regional Development Officer Beth Davidson to continue her role full-time in the region, focussing on growing the sport in deprived areas and disabled fencing.

The proposal was developed by Beth by bringing together a partnership of Durham University, Northumbria University, British Fencing, England Fencing, Street Games, The Princes Trust, Stockton Riverside College and Fencing North East, all of which are providing support to the project through direct and in-kind funding. Further funding came from UK Steel Enterprises to support work taking place in the Teesside area.

Durham University and Northumbria University have been involved in the North East Development project since the outset in 2008 by providing facilities and expertise. This ongoing relationship will provide opportunities for students to gain coaching qualifications and deliver community programmes locally.

Beth Davidson commented; "I'm so pleased to be in the position to continue the development of the sport in my home region and it's an honour to have great partners. Their long-term contribution has enabled us to innovate, grow and engage people in some of the most challenging areas of Britain. The support from them and Sport England has been amazing. I think achieving the Prime Minister's Big Society Award in August provided us with a boost and profile that made a difference."

FOIL CO-ORDINATOR

Sophie Troiano, who represented Great Britain for more than a decade and recently retired from international fencing, has been appointed foil co-ordinator on the International Youth Committee. She will be responsible for leading, managing and acting as representative for the foil cadet and junior age groups. Mark Nelson-Griffiths continues as assistant foil co-ordinator. Sophie competed at the London 2012 Olympic Games and was ranked first in the British foil rankings last year.



ROGER BARNES

Roger Barnes, seen here with the Winton and Cadet Winton trophies, died a year ago. He has been posthumously awarded Salle Joseph's Hebden Cup for services to fencing. Salle president Joe Gibbons said, "Roger contributed as a fencer and as an organiser at every level of the sport and was a true embodiment of good sportsmanship. Yet he maintained such a discrete profile that he often blended in without receiving the appropriate recognition that he deserved. It will always be a personal regret that the salle did not make this award while Roger was alive. I should so much have liked to see his owlish features expressing 'What, me?'"

FIE CONGRESS DECISIONS

2014 Junior/Cadet World Championships will be held in Plovdiv, Bulgaria (3-12 April).

••••••

2014 Senior World Championships will be held in Kazan, Russia (16-23 July).

2014 Veterans World Championships will be held in Gyor, Hungary (21-26 October).

2015 Senior World Championships will be held in Moscow, Russia.

The two events to be dropped from the Rio 2016 Olympics are men's sabre team and women's foil team.



Steve Higginson was named a Member of Honour of the FIE, only the fourth Briton ever to be so honoured. He was a member of the FIE Rules Commission from 1989 to 2012 and its president from 2001 to 2008. Fluent in French (and German), he has been responsible for translating the English version of the Rules for Competitions since 1973 and has worked on a number of FIE publications including, most recently, the centenary History of Fencing. He is currently chair of the BFA Rules Committee.

AS OF 1 JANUARY 2014

Fencers training/warming up and not wearing full FIE-level clothing are liable to be penalised by the supervisor or DT with a yellow card followed by a black. (t.15.2/t.120)

Calling halt when a fencer goes off the piste/passes an opponent: both these actions clarified as 'completely' – ie, completely off the piste, goes completely past his opponent (t.21, t.26)

Mask wire: Foilists and sabreurs must now present themselves on the piste with a spare mask wire (t.45, t.120)

The beat on the blade at foil, to have right of way as an attack, is now required, as at sabre, to be made on the foible of the opponent's blade (t.56)

Sabre target, now defined as 'any part of the body above a horizontal line drawn between the tops of the hip bones and then horizontally round the fencer's trunk'.

Threatening or insulting an official is now spelled out as a black card offence (t.82.3)

Non-combativity: The need for there to be blade contact at least every 15 seconds has been dropped. (t.87.4)

For senior World Cup/Grand Prix/ Zonal competitions the organisers must now send the FIE the pools and relevant schedules, as well as the list of exempt fencers, at the latest at 3:00 p.m. (local time) the day before the competition. No addition may be made to the pools already published, unless they come from pools starting at the same time.

Late entries for World Cups (senior and junior, individual and team), zonal and satellite events may be made even after the deadline of the Wednesday before the event until 12 noon (local time) the day preceding the competition on payment of a higher penalty fee to the FIE (0.54. 2)

AS OF 1 MARCH 2014

Age of Majority: all participants in an official competition of the FIE who are under the age of majority in the country in which such competition is being held must either: 1) be accompanied by a person who is a parent or guardian of the participant or who has been delegated, on a form valid in the country of the competition, from a parent or guardian of such participant to act on behalf of the participant regarding health-related issues; or 2) have such power of attorney issued to a person who has achieved his/her majority and who will be at the competition site during the competition and has agreed to accept the responsibility delineated in such power.

The wearing of the transparent mask is forbidden at all weapons and in all FIE competitions at all age categories.

For the 2014-15 season (ie, from September, 2014) there will be a new order of fights for pools of 6 (0.14-15):

1-2	5-4	6-4
4-3	1–6	2-3
6-5	3-5	1-4
3-1	4-2	5-2
2–6	5-1	3-6

For the 2014-15 season there will be World Cup junior team competitions, with all four of the competitions scheduled contributing to a world ranking, on which the seeding for the Junior World Team Championships will be based.

Message from the Chair

With a "Happy New Year" message to all our members, volunteers, fencers young and old – here I am with a look ahead to 2014.

Let me update you on the Board. After the restructure, we are now 11 members, with eight elected and three independent appointments. Four Directors (Graham Paul, William Pitt, John Troiano, Georgina Usher) have now completed 12 months and three (Paul Abrahams, Tom Cadman, Clare Halsted) have done six months. Alp Orge stood for election again, last April, so is now the longest serving Director (with myself). Our new appointment, Janet Campbell, is our first Independent Director after you, the members, agreed that innovation at the May General Meeting. Julia Bracewell has just stood down, I'm very sad to say, because of pressure from work and family commitments. So, we are a Board of 11, with one further Independent Director to be sought by public and open competition in the New Year.

We are now moving to another phase of change, in the Executive. We are seeking a new and full time CEO, replacing Peter King when he concludes his agreed and very effective stint with us at the end of March. We also plan to recruit a full time Development Director at the same time.

Our plans are dependent on funding, of course. We expect answers early next year to the detailed cases we have made, in recent months, to Sport England and UK Sport, covering our Grow and Gold programmes. Much depends on the resources we have, but your Board and management are determined to progress forward with our ambitious 2024 strategic goals: to be the leading fencing nation, to have 50,000 members and to become the best run sports governing body. As we enter 2014, we are just a decade away. Can we hit those targets? Yes, we can, but only through a major team effort, involving the whole community, our stakeholders and partners.

It's a helpful sign that we have now received the "Green" rating for our governance.

In 2014, your Board has a number of priorities within the "3G" strategy. Let me highlight a few, so that you can check the progress we make:

- continue effective management of finances;
- implement our Review of BF Committees;
- complete the Board's Review of our competitions/events, led by Paul Abrahams. The changes will take effect from next season and will include improvements to the senior British championships;
- put in place the new Talent Pathway;
- develop the Grow and Gold programmes, within the funding provisions;
- continue to improve our communications;
- work on appropriate changes in the membership scheme, to enhance value for money and recruit more members;
- develop the right management systems, for our 2024 ambitions.

Overall, we are determined as a Board to win your trust in both us and in British Fencing. To do so, we have to keep listening, communicating and getting results. It's vital you give feedback (good or bad) to me, the Directors and management.



MEN'S FOIL

A field of 66 fencers competed for the men's foil title, but both finalists emerged from the same first round poule. Marcus Mepstead (Sussex House) and Alex Tofalides (Salle Paul) were unlucky to draw each other so early on, but Mepstead won that encounter to make him fifth seed for the direct elimination stages whilst Tofalides was ranked 14th. Both fencers made light work of reaching the semi-finals where Mepstead beat Richard Kruse (Paul) 15-10 and Tofalides defeated Ben Peggs (Paul) 15-11.

With both fencers training together in the World Class Programme, it was no surprise that the first period was a cagey affair. But it was a surprise that the usually aggressive Tofalides decided to adopt defensive tactics. Although they did just enough to avoid a call of noncombativity during the first period, the score was deadlocked at o-o and in the second period non-combativity was called. Despite an early foray from Mepstead, the third period also ended in a non-combativity call and no score, with both fencers happy to wait for a final minute of fencing. When non-combativity is called in the final period of a fight, a full minute of fencing follows regardless of who scores first. Priority only comes into play if the scores are level at the end of that minute.

Priority was awarded to Mepstead, but Tofalides stuck to his defensive tactics and retreated to the back line, where he had spent much of the fight. Scoring first was crucial and his tactics paid off when Mepstead attacked and Tofalides hit with a riposte. With only seconds on the clock, Mepstead was forced to attack again, but each time he did Tofalides hit with twisting counter-attacks. At 4-0 down Mepstead managed to score a consolation hit, but Tofalides took the crown 4-1.

WOMEN'S FOIL

Georgia Hannay (Bristol) and Dominique Szokolovics (Sussex House) emerged from a field of 38 to fight off for the women's foil title. An exceptionally slow start saw Hannay drop three fights in the first round, leaving her ranked a lowly 24th for the knock-out stages of the tournament. Szokolovics – making a come-back seven years after last winning the title as Dominique Stowell - didn't have the perfect start either, but dropped only one fight to be ranked 10th. Both found their form in the DE stages and made the quarter-finals quite easily. There, Hannay faced the in-form and No. 1 ranked Catherine Cook (Shetland). A close encounter followed, but Hannay squeezed through 15-14 and then defeated Leah King (Sussex House) 15-11 in the semis. Szokolovics also had a tough quarter-final match, just defeating the No. 2 seed and 2010 champion Natalia Sheppard (Unattached) 10-9 at time before taking out Catriona Sibert (Edinburgh) 15-7 in the other semi.

Szokolovics made the better of a cautious first period in the final, leading 4-2 going into the break. Both fencers kept a long distance with Hannay looking to use the counter-attack, a tactic that paid off as she took a 5-4 lead into the second break. But Szokolovics retook the lead with some well-timed attacks in the third period, forcing Hannay to attack with less than a minute left. Szokolovics was then able to pick her opponent off, winning her third national title 15-5.

MEN'S EPEE

The largest event of the weekend saw 91 competitors take part, Paul Sanchez-Lethem (Brixton) and David Gregory (Cheshire) coming through the first round seeded No. 1 and 2 respectively. Their rankings were a true reflection of their form on the day as they faced each other for the title.

After a double to start proceedings, a beautiful high-low attack to foot from Sanchez-Lethem was matched by an equally well-timed low-high attack from Gregory to bring the score to 2-all. The tactics of both fencers became more apparent in the second period, with Sanchez-Lethem looking to launch surprise attacks while Gregory sought to work off his opponent's attacks using stop-hits or blocking counter-attacks. Gregory came out on top at the end of the second period, leading 7-5 and then extended his lead to 12-9.

As time ticked away, it became apparent that all was not well with Gregory, a seemingly innocuous hit to the thumb in his semi-final match now starting to take its toll. He tried to stay away from his opponent, but a fleche attack saw Sanchez-Lethem close the gap to 12-10 and then score another hit as he pushed Gregory over his back line. Looking to steady the ship, Gregory launched his first attack of the match successfully, but Sanchez-Lethem continued his own attacking game to take the score to 13-12. With just 25 seconds remaining, the two fencers went toe-to-toe in the middle of the piste and after a messy exchange Sanchez-Lethem levelled at 13-all. This intriguing tactical battle went into a final minute with Gregory winning priority, which allowed him to stick to his original game plan of playing off his opponent's attack. He did just that, taking the title 14-13 is a compelling gold medal match. The bronze medals went to Chris Greensides (RAF) and Nick Perry (Haverstock).

WOMEN'S EPEE

Despite dropping a fight each in the first round, Corinna Lawrence (Unattached) and Georgina Usher (Lansdowne) fought their way through a field of 64 to make the gold medal match in this event.

Lawrence started the better of the two, employing skillful footwork on the attack and in defence to go 2-0 up. Usher's experience played a big part in the pace of the fight though and she closed the gap to 4-3. A furious exchange followed, ending with both attacking each other in the low line and in turn blocking each other out. Lawrence reacted more sharply to go 5-3 up and then closed the first period with a well-timed fleche to lead 6-3. At 10-6 up in the second period, Lawrence looked to have done enough to close this fight out, but Usher had other ideas. She slowed the fight down and her patience paid off as she went into the break only two hits down at 11-9.

In the third period the two traded hits to take the score to 13-11. Again Usher's experience shone through as she leveled the match at 13-13 with one attacking and one defensive move. Now this enthralling fight came down to which fencer was brave enough to take the match to their opponent. A short attack from Lawrence drew Usher's counter, which was blocked and a single light came up for Lawrence – second-intention fencing at its best. With time running out, Usher was forced to go on the attack, playing into Lawrence's hands who took the title 15-13. The bronze medals went to Jayne Crook (Wingerworth) and Amy Radford (Malvern).

MEN'S SABRE

With 71 fencers taking part in this event, it was Alex Crutchett (Brentwood) and James Honeybone (Truro) who made it through to the final at the expense of bronze medalists Soji Aiyenuro (Camden) and Maiyuran Ratneswaran (Imperial College).

In a repeat of the 2011 final, Honeybone started well, going 3-0 up, but Crutchett attacked insistently and before long the scores were level at 5-all. During this comeback, Honeybone was hurt and clearly flustered on a number of occasions. However, three sharp attacks from him in reply to only one from Crutchett saw them going into the break with the Truro fencer leading 8-6. At the start of the second period, an assured and mature display from Crutchett brought the scores level at 8-all, only for Honeybone to steal the lead back with a stunningly well-timed attack. A beautifully executed parry riposte from Crutchett, based on a supreme command of distance saw him level things up again. After a number of simultaneous attacks, Crutchett took the lead for the first time and at 13-11 up the momentum had swung. Honeybone was on the back foot and the fight looked to be over as Crutchett went ahead 14-12 and was on the brink of adding the 2013 title to the one he won in 2011. But it was not to be, as Honeybone dug deep and drew level with two well-executed attacks. A series of simultaneous attacks followed and it was Honeybone who held his nerve to take the title 15-14.

WOMEN'S SABRE

Despite dropping a fight each in the first round, Jessica Davies (Bath) and Sophie Williams (Truro) fought their way through to the final from a field of 38. Both fencers had one tricky fight on the way: Williams just edged out Jo Hutchison (Camden) 15-14 in the quarter-finals and Davies came through against Harriet Dixon (Millfield) by the same score in the semis.

In the final Davies started the stronger, quickly going into a 3-1 lead with a variety of moves. All of a sudden, Williams moved up a gear, scoring the next four hits, and maintained this pressure to take an 8-5 lead into the break. A more cautious approach from Davies at the start of the second period rewarded her for a short time, but then Williams sprung back to life to go 11-7 up. Despite a late rally from Davies, Williams was not to be outdone and took the title 15-10. The bronze medals went to Dixon and Zoe Robinson (Camden).

Wheel chair Championships

The British Disabled Fencing Association held their national championships alongside the British championships in Sheffield. Saturday's competition started with sabre. In the men's Cat A event, Piers Gilliver (Wellington) was ranked No. 1 after the poules and went on to take the gold medal, beating Tom Hall-Butcher (BDFA) 15-6 in the final. Daniel Puckey (Truro) edged out club mate Matthew Campbell-Hill 15-14 to take the bronze.



In Cat B, Dimitri Coutya (St Pauls/St Benedict's) collected the first of three gold medals by defeating Shah Rashid (Salle Ursa) 15-12 in the final, with David Heaton (Red Rose) beating Dan Smith (Salle Ursa) 15-11 for the bronze.

In the Cat A foil event, Piers Gilliver took an early 4-0 lead in the final, but Simon Wilson (Notts/Wingerworth) battled back to win 15-12 and take his sixth consecutive foil title. Matthew Campbell-Hill beat Daniel Puckey 15-14 for the bronze.

Dimitri Coutya again met Shah Rashid in the Cat B final and, although Rashid fought hard, Coutya went on to win 15-10. David Heaton took bronze beating Dan Smith 15-9.

The epee competitions on Sunday saw national champion Piers Gilliver dominate the Cat A event, beating Daniel Puckey 15-5 in the final, Matthew Campbell-Hill taking bronze with a 15-9 victory over Simon Wilson.

The Cat B event saw Dimitri Coutya complete his clean sweep of titles by beating Dan Smith 15-6 in the final.

In the Women's Cat A sabre final, a closely contested match saw Gabi Down (Touche) take the gold medal and retain her national title, beating Natalie Child (Newcastle) 15-14. Down repeated her victory over Child in the foil event, winning convincingly 15-4. But in the epee final, Down met Gemma Collis (Durham Uni) and at 10-all Collis took the lead, going on to win 15-11.

World Combat Games Champion Richard Kruse

KRUSE IS WORLD COMBAT GAMES CHAMPION

Richard Kruse won the men's foil event at the World Combat Games in St Petersburg in October, beating Race Imboden (USA) 15-4 in the final. This was the second Games of its kind (the first was held in 2010) and the first time that fencing has been included as one of the sports.

The tournament invited the top 12 ranked fencers in the world at each weapon, with no more than two from any country, plus one each from Europe, Asia, Africa and the Americas to make a very strong line up. Britain was represented by Kruse and James Davis. In the first round Davis met Le Pechoux (FRA) and lost 7-15. Kruse found himself facing former world champion Andrea Baldini (ITA) and was soon 5-1 up before the Italian fought back to equalise. Kruse again pulled ahead to lead 14-9 and thought to have the match wrapped up, but the Italian managed to score three hits in succession with well timed attacks before Kruse won 15-12. "I have so much respect for Baldini and believed that if I could beat him then I could beat anyone else in that tournament", said Richard.

In the quarter-finals he met Alexey Cheremisinov (RUS), a bogeyman who beat him in the 2012 European championships and again in Tokyo in 2013. After a good start Kruse began to tire and the Russian led 10-9 at one stage. Recovering after the break, Kruse adopted a defensive strategy of counter-attacks, stop hits and parry ripostes mixed with a few attacks to keep him guessing and ran out the winner at 15-12.

In the semis he met top seed Artur Akhmatkhuzin (RUS), who had knocked him out of the London Olympics and won the La Corunna world cup last season. Less mobile than Cherimisinov, he likes to fence at a tight distance, but Kruse adopted the same defensive game to win 15-10.

In the other half of the draw, Olympic silver medallist Alaaeldin Abouelkassem (EGY) defeated No. 2 seed Andrea Cassara (ITA) 15-9, but was in turn bundled out by Race Imboden (USA) 15-6. The other quarter-finals saw Akhmatkhuzin edge out Peter Joppich (GER) 15-14 and 2013 world champion Miles Chamley-Watson (USA) beat Le Pechoux 15-9. Imboden then dominated the semi-final against his team mate to win 15-3.

Kruse began the final highly focused and determined to succeed. After a shaky start, he completely dominated the match. "By the end I was hitting him with every shot I went for and won easily", Richard added. "I would like to say a big thanks to James Davis who lost his first match but was still happy to stay in the venue and coach me throughout the day. James and I had a very enjoyable week in St Petersburg and watched as many combat sports as we could manage. We often forget that fencing is also a combat art because we are involved in a sports version of it; if we did it for real, it would be deadly! Therefore I am pleased that western fencing has been included in the programme of the World Combat Games."

In the match for bronze, Akhmatkhuzin prevailed over Chamley-Watson, who suffered from a leg injury, 15-12.

FIE CELEBRATES CENTENARY IN LAVISH STYLE



FIE President Alisher Usmanov is believed to have spent around £3 million on the most spectacular fencing party ever held to celebrate the organisation's centenary in Paris.

A gala dinner for more than 1000 guests from some 140 federations in the splendid Grand Palais, a backdrop of dazzling images across an entire wall culminating in a kaleidoscopic mix of glittering swords accompanied by Khachaturian's Sabre Dance performed by the Moscow Chamber Orchestra, a scantily clad troupe of dancers from the Lido de Paris holding epees and performing a specially created anniversary ballet, a brilliant back-projected 3D epee match and a fencing fashion show in which a dozen manufacturers presented imaginative ideas for outfits of the future were followed by stunning performances from two American virtuosi musicians -Grammy Award-winning jazz trumpeter Chris Botti and violinist Caroline Campbell – all topped off with a live concert by British rock star Sting.

Usmanov's special advisor Maxim Paramanov and his team worked for 6 months to prepare the Gala, with artistic director Nathalie Moellhausen, a member of the Italian epee team until the London 2012 Olympics and director of the opening ceremony at the Paris 2010 world championships, taking 18 months' time off from her fencing career to develop all the special events. She drew inspiration from a line in The Book of Five Rings by Miyamoto Musashi, "We are all masters of ourselves", to create a cleverly choreographed 3D match of five three-hit bouts in which a fencer takes a journey through five levels of fighting corresponding to the four elements of earth, air, water and fire, plus a fifth element called ether. He has to overcome obstacles related to these elements, as well as an unknown opponent whose identity he will discover if he is successful. After winning the match, our hero unmasks his opponent to reveal that he has been fighting... himself.

"The book offers a valuable lesson in any field of life," said Moellhausen. "That we are responsible for our actions, whether they end in success or failure. We are the only masters of ourselves. For me the goal was to write a story that used Mapping technology to emphasise the beauty of fencing and show how modern systems of entertainment can attract a worldwide audience."

LEON PAUL Fencing Centre

For 40 years former Olympic fencer Barry Paul had a dream: a purpose-built centre where fencers could train at any time of day and where major competitions could be held. In September 2013 that dream came true when Leon Paul opened the UK's first combined training and competition venue. The facility gives clubs and their fencers the opportunity to train in a state-ofthe-art centre every day of the week, all year round, as well as enjoying long sessions with no inconvenience or lost time setting up and packing away fencing apparatus.

Being able to plan the centre from scratch, the company has incorporated several features not seen anywhere else in the world. It is built on a mezzanine level above the Leon Paul fencing shop and the fencing area alone is over 730m2 with 12 competition-sized aluminum pistes built flush into the floor, spaced out for competitions, and a further 12 aluminum training pistes. With all the wiring hidden under the floor, boxes suspended from the ceiling and repeater lights at the end of the pistes (even Olympic-style lighting around the competition pistes), it is the perfect fencing environment.

Special fencing-bag-size shelving helps keep the floor clear of fencing bags and, with members' lockers at the centre, the days of carrying weapons to and from training on public transport will be a thing of the past. High spec changing rooms are another little luxury, along with an Olympic lifting platform for elite fencers to do their programmes. Strength & Conditioning coaches from Middlesex University are on hand to help any fencer wanting to start that sort of training. To make the centre inclusive for all, there is a social and viewing area for fencers to mingle before, during and after training. Parents have somewhere comfortable to watch their children train, with the advantage of free wifi to catch up on work or just pass the time.



Competitions

Another reason for building the centre was to have a venue that could stage fencing competitions of the highest standard. A new competition website has all the details of upcoming events, a real-time online entry and payment system and a comprehensive set of results detailing every fight that takes place in the competition.

All events held at the centre have dedicated staff, including referees and floor managers, as well as being run to pre-published timetable. Because Leon Paul owns the venue, entry fees can be spent in improving the competition experience for the fencer rather than the hire of a hall and equipment.

Competitions held at the centre to date have included a series of Opens using the senior World Cup format, a BSC cadet epee tournament and the first round of the Leon Paul League, a new set of intermediate events.

Courses

Fencing is more than just training and competing. The centre caters for all areas of the sport with courses in armoury, a refereeing school and coaching seminars. The venue provides the opportunity for Leon Paul to work closely with fencers and test new equipment in a laboratory.

Hiring the facilities

The fencing centre is open from 9 am to 10 pm. Anyone can hire the facilities and several coaches have already started using the pistes to give private lessons during the day and evening. Full details of how you can do this are on the website.

Other users of the centre include international teams who need a space to hold squad training, short camps and competition preparation. Several university teams have also started to hold their league matches there. Salle Paul Foil Club is the centre's resident foil club and an epee club is currently being created. The new Leon Paul fencing centre



The Future

Leon Paul felt it was important to get the centre up and running as soon as possible. Phase II plans are already in place to take some of the downstairs space and construct a comprehensive gym facility and physiotherapy room, as well as an athletes' lounge complete with licensed bar and Sky TV.

Matthew Thompson



MATTHEW THOMPSON (1956-2013)

Matthew Thompson, 57, died of cancer at his home in Abingdon, Oxfordshire on 12th October 2013. Matthew was born in Leeds, but the family – father Jack, a civil servant, mother Hilda, a teacher, brother Robert and sisters Isobel and Camilla – soon moved to Sheffield and later to Radcliffe on Trent, where Matthew went to nearby West Bridgford College.

In 1983, he moved south to Abingdon which became his home for the rest of his life, and where he discovered his great love - the sport of fencing. He was coached by John Llewellyn and Tomek Walicki, later becoming a coach himself, studying under Gabor Bognar, Peter Frolich and Zolte Nemeth. From this base in Oxfordshire, Matt travelled the country as a freelance engineering contractor, often working on contracts many miles from home. Wherever he found himself, he would turn up at the local fencing club, drop his kit bag in the corner and start the process of making new friends – a network which continued to grow throughout his life.

In 2001, after a quiet period in the engineering trade, he decided to take the plunge and become a full-time fencing coach, turning his passion into his livelihood. He coached at clubs throughout the local area, including Oxford, Newbury and Abingdon, as well as at schools, notably the Dragon School in Oxford.

As a coach, Matthew had many successful pupils, in particular Ben White (foil & epee) and Lydia Stanier (foil & epee), who collected many regional and national titles over several years, along with multiple international representative honours. However, it was typical of Matthew that he would take as much pride in a well-executed action from one of his 'young Dragons' in a school bout as he would when one of his high-performing fencers won a national championship.

He was also a regular referee on the fencing circuit and, in addition to the normal refereeing duties, would provide an entertaining if sometimes witheringly critical commentary on the fencing performance of his friends and acquaintances.

Given his passion for the sport, and for youth fencing in particular, it was inevitable that Matthew would become involved in its governing structures. He was actively involved with Berks, Bucks and Oxon county union, creating the still-popular 'fencing picnic', and with the Southern regional association. He later served two terms on the board of England Fencing – firstly as Youth Director, and subsequently as a non-executive director.

He took over the running of the England Fencing youth performance programme Tomorrow's Achievers in 2005 – a programme which he ran until a few weeks before his death. As Youth Director, he was the strategic lead behind the reshaping of England Fencing's youth championships, and guided the founding of the U15 trips to Paris and Poland which are now an established fixture in the youth fencing calendar, attending all of the former and several of the latter as an official. For his services to the sport, England Fencing honoured him with a gold medal in June 2013.

After receiving his diagnosis, Matthew turned his attention to practical matters. With no dependents to consider, he established the Matthew Fencing Trust whose aims are:

To aid young fencers in their development by providing facilities for young fencers through access to competitions and supporting them in being able to go and therefore gain appropriate experience, both fencing and other, that will enhance their development and performance both home and abroad.

With his irreverent sense of humour intact until the last, he planned his own funeral, taking his final journey in a coffin designed to look like a Cadbury chocolate box, to the strains of the Goon's Ying-tong song. He will be sadly missed by his family and wide circle of friends.

Breast and chest protector Development

In 1981 a nun at a New Zealand girls' school asked a local plastics company to make a breast shield for pupils playing football. The original product was made from a formable resin baked in an oven, and it led QP Sport to become the only company in the world focussing solely on breast and chest protection.

Ever since women started fencing in the late 19th century, there has been a need for added protection. Initially, jackets were simply designed with extra quilting, as shown in an 1885 illustration of the latest outfit for the well-dressed lady fencer published in the French fashion journal, L'Art et la Mode (Fig. 1). She wears a white patent leather embossed jerkin with red plush velvet sleeves and a broad red silk corset belt.



In 1902, Lady Colin Campbell, one of the pioneers of women's fencing, was said to wear a loose silk shirt over a narrow corset belt and a padded suede jacket. Jackets made from linen, twill and moleskin were also available, although the outfit worn by a so-called female fencing master depicted on a 1905 postcard (Fig. 2) looks to be more eye-catching than practical.




By 1924 women were fencing at the Olympics and manufacturers realised they needed to meet a demand for protection that went beyond a bit of extra padding. By the late 20s the big names, like Souzy and Prieur, were making jackets with inside pockets into which two types of protector could be fitted: wire mesh (Fig. 3) or padded cloth. In 1934 Soudet was the first to offer protectors made from aluminium (Fig. 4) and soon all fencing equipment suppliers were offering a variety of slip-in cups.



After the war, Leon Paul began offering vacuum formed protectors (Fig. 5). However, sizes were restricted to small or medium and further progress was slow in coming. Uhlmann's catalogue of 1964 still showed wire and leather inserts (Fig. 6) and Castello offered two plastic variations in 1975 (Fig. 7). Then in the 1980s the breast shield became available.








By the 1990s Leon Paul's catalogue featured QP Sport's Econoguard injection moulded shield (Fig. 8) in an expanded size range. When the FIE established a breast protection standard in 2001, it was based on the company's product, soon to include the Masterguard chest protector for men (Fig. 9). Through the lead fencing has taken in protecting its female participants, other sports have followed, including martial arts, paintball and various ball sports. Today the company collaborates with Portsmouth and Sheffield-Hallam universities in developing new breast protection products.

FENCING TIME

FENCING TIME VERSION 4

Fencing Time is a well regarded program for running tournaments, albeit with a strong American bias. Dan Berke, the author of the program, has now produced the next version, which not only removes the Americanisms but adds a number of new features.

Localisation and Internationalisation

An irritant with the current version is the use of terms such as 'strip' instead of 'piste'. The new version offers a British English translation that removes all such American terms. However, the major change is that the new version runs under an authority, in the case of the UK this is the BFA. This serves to define licences, regions and some competition formula (e.g. age group competitions now have DE bouts to 10 hits rather than best of three 5-hit bouts).

The Database

One of the great advantages of Fencing Time has always been the database, enabling one to enter competitors without having to retype their information each time. This has now been extended so it holds referee information as well. A significant change is the ability to hold multiple licences, e.g. a BFA and an FIE licence. Most importantly, it offers the ability to use a shared database. This allows multiple systems to share the same data and allows extensive new functionality.

Client/Server Mode

Running in 'client/server' mode allows multiple PCs to connect to the database, which allows a number of possibilities:

- Check-in can be done on the computer rather than on paper; there is a specific profile for this
- Multiple operators in the DT can use common data
- An application to drive remote monitors is provided which can display status information, such as entrants, poule composition and DE bouts together with pistes and times

Tournament Management

Fencing Time has always been known as a tournament management program, able to manage multiple competitions with a single instance of the program, rather than requiring an instance per competition.

Features that have now been added include:

- Automated allocation of pistes and times
- Automated allocation of referees from a list of tournament referees to particular competitions and poules or DE bouts within a competition.
- Specification of a formula for competitions; while this is not significant for domestic competitions, a standard list of formulae appropriate for international competitions is supplied

Live Results

Waiting for information is not something that today's socially networked youngsters are accustomed to. Fencing Time obliges by automating the publication of results live to the web as the tournament runs.

Version 4.0 will run domestic and international competitions, but has not yet been homologated by the SEMI of the FIE; once this happens, version 4.1 will be released. There will be a change of licensing for stand-alone and server editions of the program.

This is a significant upgrade to an already excellent program; those who are not committed to other programs are recommended to take a look at it.

Book reviews



FENCING AT WESTMINSTER by Edmund Gray and Edmund Wareham

Westminster was one of the first public schools to employ a fencing master, Domenico Angelo, from 1766 if not earlier. There has been a continuous tradition of fencing at the school ever since and in their book, Fencing at Westminster School 1766-2013, Edmund Gray and Edmund Wareham have meticulously recorded the personalities and achievements of its leading fencers. At the same time, they trace the development of fencing from an accomplishment of a gentleman to a modern sport against the background of the evolving school.

Those who fenced with distinction at Westminster and went on to have distinguished careers included Lord Adrian, Nobel Prize physiologist and Chancellor of Cambridge University, Pierre Turquet, who was a member of every British world championship sabre team from 1937 to 1955, Nigel Lawson, Chancellor of the Exchequer, the actor Corin Redgrave and Nick Halsted, president of the AFA.

The book, which marks 25 years of coaching at the school by Tomek Walicki, costs £10 (including p&p) and is available from Edmund Gray, 118 Church Way, Iffley, Oxford OX4 4EG.

VFTS NFWS WORI D CHAMPIONSHIPS

Another year, another star emerges. On reaching the age of 70 after years of fencing in relative obscurity, Malcolm Cawton swept aside the world's best sabreurs in his age group to win Britain's only gold medal at the 2013 world championships in Varna, Bulgaria. Earlier in the week, he had already taken silver in the men's foil event, only Russia's master foilist Gari Aftandilov preventing him becoming a double world champion.

The men's 70+ sabre final was an all-British affair, with Bill Osbaldeston using his well honed epee technique to confound more conventional sabreurs and take out the reigning European champion Aftandilov 10-4, No. 2 seed Spertini (FRA) 10-5 and former champion Nettingsmeyer (GER) 10-6 before narrowly conceding defeat to Cawton 8-10.

Britain's third silver medal was won by Jane Hutchison in the women's 50+ sabre where she maintained her No. 2 seeding after the poules to reach the final, but found the reigning world and European champion, Friederike Janshen of Germany, too strong and went down 6-10.

Janet Cooksey rarely enters a veterans' event without winning a medal and these world championships were no exception. although she had to settle for bronze in both 70+ foil and epee, as she fell to the incomparable Marie Chantal Demaille of France in the semi-finals of both events. Demaille achieved the unique distinction in 2013 of making a clean sweep of European and world titles at every weapon.

Other bronze medals were won by Richard Bonehill in 60+ men's sabre, edging out the No. 2 seed Patrick Pele (FRA) 10-9 and former champion Wang Yung (USA) 10-8 before falling to the reigning world champion Giulio Paroli (ITA) in the semis; Silvia Earl in 60+ women's sabre, who just beat teammate and No. 4 seed Sue Benney 10-9 and then Linda Dunn (USA) 10-7 before falling to Jane Eyre (USA) who went on to win the championship; and Malcolm Fare in 70+ men's epee, who rode his luck with a couple of 10-9 victories before falling to Ermes Cassago (ITA) who won the title.

SUSSEX OPEN

One of the highest standard Sussex Opens in recent memory took place over a chilly weekend in October. Some closely fought matches in the 53-strong men's epee event saw Jamie Stuart of Redhill & Reigate knock out Crawley's Dudley 'Deadly' Tredger 15-14 on his way to the final, where he met Chris Rocks of Shetland, who had achieved a similarly nail-biting finish against Harrison Nichols of Salle Gadaski. The final ended in a climactic 15-13 win for Rocks.

Nicola Hull of Dream Fencing took the straightforward route to the final of the women's epee and delivered a 15-12 win over Reading's Verity Howell.

Crawley's Chiara McDermott won her third consecutive women's foil title with clear wins throughout, beating Emily Goodchild of Wellington 15-6 in the final.

In the men's foil, Rafa Lagattolla of Saxon had to fend off the thrusts and lunges of Brighton & Hove's Brian 'Snake hips' Causton and then the eventual top old-boy and joint bronze medallist Tony Bartlett of Lansdowne to reach the final. There he met the No. 1 seed, Glen Ostacchini of Salle Boston, who had knocked out the top under-18 fencer Luke Deamer of Crawley in the semis and went on to take the title with a convincing 15-7 victory.
